P. E. ISLAND MAGAZINE

With the March number the second volume of the Prince Edward Island Magazine begins. Every number of this magazine during the first year has been a creditable production. And the number which we have before us augurs well for its continual improvement during its second volume.

"The Idle Hour," a beautiful landscape photograph taken near Cornwall, forms the front-piece, and a picture of the Pre-byterian church at Belfast adorns the cover. "A Reverie," and "Our Boys," from the gilded pen of Mrs. May Carroll, "To a Wounded Tern," by Jeremiah S. Clark, and "Rose-sons of the Empire," by M. W. M., form the poetical contributions.

The continuation of Prof. Caven's article on "The First Settlement of Three Rivers, (Georgetown)" with a copy of an old French plan of the Port des Trois Rivieres; of Senator McDonald's Scottish Associations in P. E. I. land, with photographs of Wm. McNeill, E. G., and J. W. Morrison, E. G., former prominent members of the society; of Mr. Hubert G. Compton's, "The Early Settlers of St. Eleanor's," and of Mr. John Ross, "Tenant League Results," make important additions to the Island history already brought forward through the P. E. Island Magazine.

Rev. W. H. Warren, in his "Remnants of Acadian Dykes," presents a romantic picture of early Island scenes, and Rev. W. J. Kirby contributes "English meanings of Irish names."

"A Prince County Ghost Story," by J. Morrison, is very interesting and incidentally gives much information concerning that part of the Island of which Bidford, Tyne Valley, Ellerslie, Port Hill and Lot II are the centres.
