Georgetown Lady Dies

\*Georgetown suffered the loss of one of its oldest and most highly respected citizens in the death of Mrs. Sophia Boudreau, on Sunday, August 27, at her home here, in her 91st year. The late Mrs. Boudreau had been confined to bed for a considerable time but during her illness, her indomitable courage and faith, coupled with a remarkable physique for a lady of her advanced years, never failed her and she continued to interest herself with the happenings of the day and of her town, right up to the last. The deceased was born in Arichat, Cape Breton, 91 years ago, the daughter of Captain Desire King and moved to Georgetown when she was six years of age. She continued her residence here during the past 85 years. During her lifetime, she has witnessed many and varied changes take place in our town and she had lived to see her son, Georgetown's present Mayor, Mr. P. L. Boudreau, hold the office of Chief

Magistrate of his adopted place of residence on several occasions. Her husband pre-deceased her some considerable number of years ago. Left to mourn her passing are: —one daughter, Eva, Mrs. Peter Gotell of Georgetown and five sons: James of Montague; Perry, L. Fabian and Anthony, all of Georgetown and John of Newport.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, August 29 at 9:30 a. m. from her home to St. James Roman Catholic Church, where her pastor, Rev. O. Kiggins celebrated Solemn Requiem High Mass, assisted by Rev. Joseph Campbell of Western Canada as Deacon and Rev. Bennett MacDonald of St. Georges as sub-deacon. For the service, St. James' Church Choir was under the direction of Mayor P. L. Boudreau, assisted by Rev. Bernard Gillis, D. D., of the Sacred Heart Home in Charlottetown. Interment was in the Church Cemetery. The pallbearers were: — Messrs.
