British Liner Torpedoed Recalled in Anniversary

LONDON (AP)—A brisk breeze whipped up the North Atlantic as the British liner Athenia cut through the waltz-caps on her voyage into history. It was Sunday, Sept. 3, 1939. The 13,581-ton ship was only a day out of Liverpool, bound for Montreal. Among the 1,417 passengers, 200 more than normal, there was little of the usual gaiety of an Atlantic crossing. Just before lunch time, the expected news came. Britain and Germany were at war with France.

The sweep of events in Europe dominated the conversation among passengers and crew. Many on board the Canadians and Americans who had hoped to get home before the outbreak of a general war. PASSENGERS AT DINNER At 7:45 p.m., as the sun dropped toward the horizon, the Athenia was 250 miles off the northern tip of Ireland. Some passengers were still having dinner. Suddenly, the lookout in the crow's nest shouted. "One-eight of a mile away a periscope poked through the water. A white streak of foam raced toward the ship. A moment later there was a crash. The torpedo blasted a huge hole in the port side, a few minutes later a submarine numbered U-30 surfaced and shot away at Athenia's mainmast with a deck gun. At 11 a.m. the following day the Athenia sank. She had become the first civilian casualty of the Nazi U-boats. The attack cost 112 lives: about half of the victims were Canadians or Americans. The sinking stirred an international outcry because the U-30 had struck without warning against an unarmed merchantman. In addition, neither Canada nor the United States was at war yet with Germany. Some compared the incident to the sinking of the Lusitania in 1915, which helped edge the United States into the First World War. Who had the Nazi war machine struck against the Athenia so blatantly in defiance of the rules? Obviously embarrassed, the German propagandists accused the British of

staging the sinking to drag the U.S. into the war. The Germans had made a similar accusation after the Lusitania incident. But the real story of the attack on the Athenia came out at the Nuremberg war crime trials in 1946. A statement by Admiral Karl Doenitz told how he had met the U-30 on her return to port and encountered a "very unhappy" Capt. Fritz-Julius Lemp, the submarine's skipper. Lemp told Doenitz he had mistaken the Athenia for an armed merchant cruiser on patrol. The Nazi regime imposed an oath of secrecy on everyone involved and even ordered the U-boat's log altered. U-30 went on to make several more kills.

Gov't Surplus Increased For 4 Months

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government's financial operations ran up a surplus of \$439,600,000 during the first four months of the current fiscal year compared with a \$32,100,000 surplus in the same period last year. Finance Minister Gordon reported in his monthly financial statement. In July, last month reported, the surplus was \$66,800,000 on revenues totaling \$635,000,000 and spending of \$568,200,000. Last year the July surplus was \$33,000,000. For the April-July period this year revenues were \$2,047,500,000 and spending \$1,967,900,000. A year earlier the figures were \$1,922,200,000 for revenues; \$1,901,100,000 for spending. Traditionally, however, federal bills tend to pile up towards the end of the fiscal year and Mr. Gordon has forecast a budgetary deficit of \$653,000,000 this year, compared to a deficit of \$619,000,000 in 1968-69.

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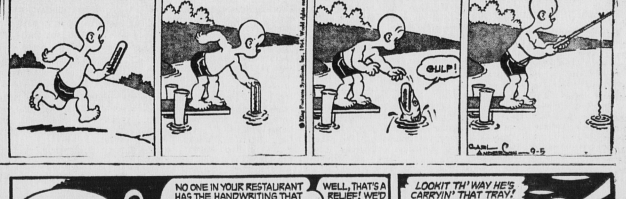
