150,000 NEEDED Skilled Immigrants Sought For Canada

HAMILTON (CP) — An immigration recruiting drive aimed at bringing 150,000 skilled workers to Canada was announced by Immigration Minister John Nicholson here Friday. Mr. Nicholson made his announcement while here for the 50th birthday of the new senior public school in the North End urban renewal area. The first step of the recruiting campaign will be the opening of a new immigration office in Milan, Italy. At present Canada's only immigration office in Italy is located in Rome. Mr. Nicholson will open the new office in the heart of Italy's industrial north during a three-week tour of European immigration centres this summer. The minister said the recruiting drive was essential to provide the skilled workers needed by the nation's rapidly-expanding secondary industries. Mr. Nicholson said manpower survey carried out in Ontario, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and New Brunswick pointed to the need for greatly augmenting the supply of skilled labor. Mr. Nicholson will also visit Cologne, Germany, Marseilles, France and Leeds, England, in his stepped-up recruiting campaign. The minister felt the increased immigration flow would help rather than hinder the government's recently announced war on poverty program in Canada. "This is an essential first step. We must develop secondary industries in this country to combat unemployment," he said. Mr. Nicholson said that the chemical, pulp and paper and mining industries were particularly in need of trained workers. "If these industries are to expand as planned we must get these workers in the next 12 months," the minister said.

Completing a record for D. Fred MacRae, Hunter River, was Rivermere Nellie with 11,854 pounds milk, 503 pounds fat for BCAs of 135 in milk, 142 fat as a mature cow. Morningside Beauty produced 11,597 pounds milk, 504 butterfat for BCAs of 132 milk, 142 fat for Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, Charlottetown RR, as a mature cow. Their Raedale Classic Lady produced 9,358 pounds milk, 428 fat for BCAs of 122 and 135 as a junior three-year-old. A number of cows completed records for the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown New Naty produced 11,270 pounds milk, 467 fat for BCAs of 128 and 131 in the mature class. There were also two junior two-year-old heifers: Charlottetown Roderick Sophia produced 9,523 pounds milk, 411 fat for BCAs of 141 and 146 and Charlottetown Gay Tammy 8,229 pounds milk, 372 fat for BCAs of 123 and 133. For Earle MacRae, New Wiltshire, Raeburn Duchess produced 10,540 pounds milk, 440 fat for BCAs of 120 and 124 as a mature cow. His Raeburn Hester produced 9,404 pounds milk, 367 fat for BCAs of 133 and 125 as a junior two-year-old. East River Precious produced 10,522 pounds milk, 401 fat for BCAs of 130 and 128 as a junior three-year-old for Almon Wood and Sons, Little York. Royalty East Raws Rose produced 11,202 pounds milk, 455 fat for BCAs of 141 milk, 139 fat as a senior three-year-old for Col. F.I. Andrew, Charlottetown.

Exhibition To Feature Hay Classes

Special classes for hay will be a feature of this year's provincial exhibition, it was announced last night by the provincial department of agriculture. There will be classes for grass hay, which may have up to 20 percent grass, and for mixed hay which is at least 65 percent grass, and for mixed hay which is at least 35 percent grass and 35 percent legume, although not necessarily in those proportions. The prize money will depend on the number of entries. As much as \$100 will be available, for example for first prize if there should be more than 20 entries. It will be \$25 if not more than 10 entries. The top money for second prize is \$50, for third \$25, for fourth \$15 and for fifth \$10, if there are more than 20 entries in the class. The respective prize money is \$20, \$15, and \$10 for fourth prize if there are not more than 10 entries. One condition is that the exhibitor must be able to satisfy the judges that he has at least one ton of similar quality hay on his farm, in case this is called for.
