estimate for that service had been increased by \$1,000. The service of the Prosecutors under the Canada Temperance Act having been dispensed with, a saving had taken place on that account of \$600. The maintenance of the Poorhouse could not be well controlled, because, so long as there was room, admission could not reasonably be refused, an increase of \$200 had accordingly been made in the estimate. Under the head of Public Buildings, an estimate of \$350 was placed for repairs to the Summer-side Courthouse, there was also an increase of \$100 in the vote for repairs to the Provincial Building, on the Stock Farm Buildings it was proposed to spend \$300, an increase of \$250 over last year. In the allowance for wharves there was a decrease of \$8,000. By the exertions of the recent delegation, the amount hitherto expended upon the construction and maintenance of wharves would henceforward be saved to the Province, and the service would be performed by the Dominion Government. There was, however, an increased expenditure upon the Charlottetown and Southport Ferry Docks of \$5,000. In the item of Bridges, there was an increase of \$1,000 over last year. The steamer "Southport" and "Elisa" had been taken off the hands of the contractor whose term had expired, they required extensive repairs, and an increase of \$2,500 had been made in the vote for these boats.

How did we propose to meet this expenditure? We estimate, said Mr. Sullivan, to receive from the Land Office \$55,000; from Provincial Secretary's office, \$1,000; from Registry office \$4,500; from Prothonotary's office \$2,500; from County Courts \$3,000; from Hospital for the Insane \$1,000; from Prince of Wales College \$250; from Private Bills \$200; from Peddlers licenses \$500; from Fines and Penalties \$200; from Rents of Bridges \$300; from arrears of Taxes \$2,000; from miscellaneous sources \$500; from the Dominion Government we expect to receive \$200,000, a little more or less, making a total revenue of \$271,150, if the receipts come in as we estimate, but a great deal depends upon the result of the season's crops. It may be asked why do we expect to receive \$200,000 from the Dominion Government. We are entitled to \$165,000 for subsidy, and out of the amount to be allowed by them for our Piers, we expect to draw enough to make \$200,000, it may be more or less just as we require. Taking into consideration the deficit of \$12,000 from last year's transactions, we require to provide this year for \$265,338, so that if the receipts come in as we anticipate, we shall have sufficient to balance the account, and bring it out square at the end of the year. This is the financial position of the Province at present. I have shown what the estimated expenditure amounts to, where the increases lie, from what sources we expect to receive the revenue, and that, at the end of the year, the account will probably be square. If any exception be taken to the figures, they can easily be verified, having been carefully prepared from the official record. The exhibit may fairly be left to the House and to the country, and although there is a deficit, we have nothing to complain of. The country is to be congratulated upon the very considerable saving which has been effected, a saving which they evidently appreciate, as, at the recent General Election, they expressed themselves satisfied with the administration of affairs by the present Government.

Current Notes.

Professor Siemens, the well-known telegraphic engineer, has been knighted.

French officers who have arrived at Tonquin report that the Chinese troops have withdrawn, and hostilities so far do not appear probable.

New Zealand threatens to send her mails via Australia and the Suez Canal unless the United States affords free transportation across the continent.

It is now reported that Mr Gladstone re-considered his intention of retiring from office and shows greater vigor and takes more active interest in public affairs.

Italy, Germany, and Austria are about to enter into a league against socialist and revolutionary practices and the unlawful use of explosive substances.

Bradlaugh, who, with the proprietor and editor of the Free Thinker, was charged with publishing a sketch of the Deity, and with blasphemous libels, has been acquitted.

Returns show a large decrease in the area of wheat cultivation in Great Britain and Europe. Austro-Hungary is the only State which returns a full acreage under wheat.

The Dictator of Ecuador has an unique way of treating revolutionists. Finding himself worsted, he offers to step down and if the revolutionary Government gives him the lucrative post of Minister to England.

Every able-bodied adult in Norway is to receive a musket and be instructed in its use at the expense of State. "This measure," writes a correspondent, "will render the large farms with their great number of servants and ploughmen little arsenals, and the warlike spirit of the farmers will receive a fresh stimulant." It is doubtful if "a fresh stimulant of Norwegian independence, which has already been stimulated almost if not quite to the point of disloyalty, will add to the security of King Oscar's final throne.

It was Carlyle's misfortune to sit on a jury. His wife relates to John Sterling the effect of the ordeal on the Chelsea philosopher. "My poor man of genius," she says, "had to sit on a jury for two days, to the ruin of his whole being, physical, moral, and intellectual. And ever since he has been reacting against the administration of British justice to a degree that has finally mounted into influenza. While I, *poverina*, have been reacting against his reaction till that malady called by the cockneys 'mental worry' fairly took me by the throat and threw me on my bed for a good many days."

Governor Butler of Massachusetts, has exposed one of the worst cases of abuse in the management of a professedly humane institution in Boston that ever came to light. The revelations are shocking. Cruelty, neglect, and filth were the rule, evidently, and the mortality, especially among the infants, has been frightful. The strangest part of it is that such a wretched state of things could have continued or so long a time in the midst of an enlightened and humane people. The work of curing for the helpless and dependent must have a brutalizing effect on the average human being, or less the attendants in this particular almshouse were worse than ordinary people. One thing is clear, and that is that almshouses and asylums of all kinds should be as subject to public inspection as though they were roofless. Publicity alone is the only safeguard for the inmates.

The papers report two or three police cases which illustrate the necessity of medical supervision. Benjamin Webster, a shoemaker from Nova Scotia, was committed for drunkenness, at Toronto, and died before the expiration of thirty days. Thomas Blythe, laborer, was committed for vagrancy, no notice being taken of the fact that he was suffering from erysipelas, and he was soon prostrated with it and nearly died. At the end of his term he was totally blind from the effects of the disease, or the lack of proper treatment at the right time. Another man, who visited the city with the hope of trying to get admitted to the hospital, but was committed to jail for vagrancy instead, is dying. The man McDonald, of P. E. Island, died in jail at St. John the other day, it is said, from want of proper attendance. He fell in an epileptic fit at the Railway station, was dragged to the police cell, and virtually left there to die.

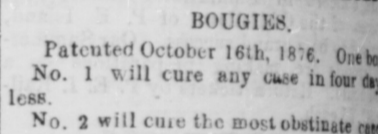
