Rangers: Better On Road Than At Home This Year

When New York Rangers take the ice against Detroit Red Wings this afternoon, they'll have the advantage of playing away from home.

How's that again?

Red Sullivan's crew hold down fifth place in the National Hockey League. Their road record is a modest 22 points in 27 outings. But that's exactly three points more than they've managed to pick up at Madison Square Garden in 26 appearances.

That doesn't necessarily make the Rangers a shoo-in against the Wings, who are riding a six-game winning streak on their own ice and have the best home record in the league—37 points from 26 games. But it illustrates an NHL trend this season.

Throughout the entire 1963-64 campaign, there were only 55 road victories against 120 losses and 35 ties, an edge of nearly 7 to 3 for the home side.

VIKTORS STRONG

This season, with 50 games left to play, visiting teams have won 60 games, tied 23 and lost only 77, an average of close to .500. Three clubs—Chicago Black Hawks, Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens—have won more games than they have lost on the road and Toronto, like the Rangers, is doing better on the road than at home.

The first-place Hawks have the league's best road record, 32 points in 27 games, while the Leafs, with 31 points away from home, have picked up only 29 at Maple Leaf Gardens.

That should make things interesting when the two clubs meet tonight at Toronto, where they have split in five previous meetings with two wins apiece and a tie.

While you're figuring the odds on that one, Bobby Hull was in the Chicago lineup two weeks ago when the Hawks clobbered the Leafs 6-3. He was missing when the Leafs beat the Hawks 2-1 in Chicago the following night and he'll be missing again with an ankle injury tonight.

BRUINS AT FORUM

Boston Bruins, who have lost their last 12 games away from home and haven't won at the Forum since Jan. 25, 1964, visit Montreal tonight.

Canadiens have 35 points from their 27 home games this season while the tail-end Bruins have a meagre eight points from their 26 road appearances.

In Sunday's pairings, Montreal is at New York, Toronto at Detroit and Boston at Chicago.

The usual reshuffle can be expected at the top. The Hawks go into the weekend with a four-point edge over the Habs, who are followed at two-point intervals by Toronto and Detroit.

Regina Curling Team Wins Schoolboy Title

FREDERICTON (CP)—It was a lot tougher than the provincial playoffs back home, members of the Saskatchewan rink agreed, but from the smiles it was obvious the reward of five days in the Canadian schoolboy curling championship here made the long trip worthwhile.

Danny Fink's Regina foursome took the crown back to the Prairie province for the ninth time in 18 years, disposing of Ontario 12-6 in the 11th round of the round-robin bonspiel Friday.

The representatives from Balfour Technical School—skip Fink, mate Ted Runtz, second Ronald Jacques and lead Larry Lechuer—compiled a 9-1 win-loss record.

They plunged into an early 3-1 lead over Paul Savages' rink from Toronto's Don Mills and added four more points in ends 4-6 to build up a four-point margin. Fink's superb curling, which permitted Ontario to count in only three ends, produced two points in the eighth end and three more in the ninth.

The Saskatchewan skip's prettiest throw of the match came in the eighth end. Ontario was shot stone with the Regina mate's rock lying two. On his last skip rock, Fink curled past two guards, nudged Ontario out of the house and left himself with shot stone and two counters.

The advancing Saskatchewan scoreboard total became a secondary focal point for the Alberta and Nova Scotia skips, locked in a do-or-die battle.
