

Porterfield Stars In Nats Win; Giants Edge Reds 5-4

Washington's Bob Porterfield cooled the league-leading Detroit Tigers with a strong four-hitter Tuesday and then nailed down a 5-3 American League victory with a home run in the ninth inning.

The 29-year-old righthander held the Tigers hitless through the last 5 1/3 innings for his third victory of the season against two losses. Al Aber, who replaced starter Ralph Branca in the fifth inning, was the loser.

In the National League, Monte Irvin's booming triple scored Alvin Dark in the eighth inning to climax an uphill drive that gave New York Giants a hard-earned 5-4 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

The victory was achieved at the expense of southpaw Fred Baczewski. Marv Grissom, last of three Giant pitchers, was credited with the victory. The 34-year-old righthander took over in the eighth after the Giants had tied the score at 4-4 with two runs in the seventh, yielding two hits and no runs in two innings.

DEFENSIVE LAPSE
Washington scored their winning run in the eighth inning, snapping a 3-3 tie with the help of a defensive lapse by Detroit second baseman Frank Bolling.

With the bases loaded and two out, Washington's Ed Fitzgerald hit what appeared to be a simple inlining-grounder to Tiger shortstop Harvey Kuenn. Kuenn slipped the ball to Bolling but the Tiger rookie dropped it, allowing Roy Sievers to score from third.

A scheduled score from third, counter between Pittsburgh and St. Louis was washed out.

Giant Gene Conley of Milwaukee Braves, the biggest rookie in the majors, shut out the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers 2-0 on eight hits Tuesday night. A towering home run by Joe Adcock and a disputed drive by Eddie Mathews that finally was ruled a double produced the

Milwaukee runs. Conley's second straight triumph was his first big league shutout. The 6-8 righthander with a sweeping sidarm motion showed the crowd of 18,000 brilliant control as he fanned seven and walked nobody.

Adcock's home run came off Russ Meyer, who was charged with his first loss.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Joe Coleman, 31-year-old righthander of the Orioles acquired from Philadelphia Athletics last December, shut out his former teammates on a brilliant two-hitter Tuesday night as he pitched Baltimore to a 2-0 victory before 10,837 fans. The victory, third straight for the improving Orioles, enabled them to sweep the two-game series with the Macks.

Coleman, once bothered by a sore arm, faced only 29 men in righthander duty in the eighth after the Giants had tied the score at 4-4 with two runs in the seventh, yielding two hits and no runs in two innings.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Del Ennis' 10th-inning single, scoring Richie Ashburn, gave the Philadelphia Phillies an 8-7 win over the Chicago Cubs Tuesday night.

Earlier Ennis had driven in three more runs with a bases-loaded double in the fifth and sixth in which both sides profited from fielding miscues.

A wild throw by rookie catcher Elvin Tappe on an attempted rundown of Earl Torgeson permitted the first two Philadelphia runs to score in the third inning, but Ashburn led in the fifth and sixth.

"In amateur fights they spring out at you the second the bell rings," said the City boxer in his explanation.

TORONTO (CP)—St. Catharines took a 2-0 lead in the Canadian Junior Hockey final Tuesday night, defeating a battling band of Edmonton Oil Kings 5-3 before 3,680 fans, one of the smallest crowds in years to see a Memorial Cup playoff.

Expect 75 Entries For Dominion Boxing Trials

TORONTO (CP) — Boxers from various parts of Canada converged on Toronto Tuesday night for the Canadian British Empire Games boxing trials May 13-15 as the boxing committee in charge debated how many rounds will constitute a bout.

British Empire Games regulations permit three three-minute rounds or five two-minute rounds as constituting a bout.

Gebrge Denniston, chairman of the central Ontario branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, said that 50 entries have already registered for the trials and he expects possibly 75 entries, the largest such field ever assembled.

Eight provinces will definitely be represented with the other two—Newfoundland and New Brunswick—yet to indicate if they will send boxers to the trials.

Ontario will have the largest number of entries with 27. Nova Scotia is sending a 13-man team, Quebec will have 16, British Columbia 10 and Prince Edward Island one. Good representation is expected from the prairie provinces.

Finalists in the various weight classes will represent Canada at the British Empire Games in Vancouver this summer.

All boxers are donating their services free of charge. This is one of the heart-warming features of a business that has been described by boxing writers as the hardest profession known to man.

CAHA Decides All-Star Team For Hockey Tourney

VANCOUVER (CP) — Canada's 1955 world tournament hockey representatives will be essentially an all-star team chosen from every section of the Dominion.

That's the essence of two hours discussion here Tuesday on the question of the second team at the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Actually, the delegates passed only one motion. It said the CAHA officers were to be given the job of selecting a team of the "highest calibre possible" to represent Canada in 1955.

But they agreed to accept until July 1 applications from teams who wished to carry Canada's colors.

Then, they said, CAHA branch officers would select the players in their territory who they felt would give the team the most help.

"A" league, but have offered to form a seven-player nucleus and build a team around it.

It would sideline an application from Sudbury Wolves, made to the CAHA meeting Monday, for the trip. Wolves said they did not want to make a pre-tournament tour. Delegates were definite that a pre-tournament tour was essential.

Delegates said they did not feel that any club should be selected from the winners or runners-up in the Allan Cup or junior tournaments.

There was no assurance that the same team that won the championship would be in existence the following year. Additionally, picking a complete team and sending it overseas would possibly break up the league to which it belonged.

Hamilton's request to make the trip was turned down by the Ontario Hockey Association executives, but it is believed it will be reconsidered.

The convention also unanimously approved a resolution asking that attempts be made to have the old facing-the-puck rule restored.

Under the change, players would carry the puck over the blue line. The rule forbids shooting the puck into the corner from outside the blue line.

The resolution asked that the CAHA negotiate with the National Hockey League, under the terms of the NHL-CAHA agreement, to have the rule change made, an important step in controlling the trend to rough, choppy, high-sticking hockey.

Only one major rule change or addition was approved. It adds a section providing that any player who leaves the ice, players' bench or penalty box to tangle with spectators will get a match penalty and an automatic suspension.
