PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Drummond and Grand Trunk Railway Deal Condemned by the Senate.

But Their Action is Burked by the Government.

OTTAWA, June 24.—The Intercolonial extension bill was taken up in the Senate yesterday. After a discussion of the bill a vote was taken on the motion that it receive the three months' hoist. The motion was carried, 37 to ten. Those who voted for the hoist were Conservatives. It is understood that several Liberals who were absent were also opposed to the measure and avoided the vote.

Hon. David Mills, who was one of the absentees, is believed to be opposed to both the Drummond deal and the Crows' Nest subsidy. Senators Wark, King, Lewing and Lovitt were also absent.

In the House of Commons the supplementary estimates were all put through except that the item of eight thousand dollars for Laurier's expenses in London was reserved to allow Hon. Mr. Foster to make some complimentary remarks thereon.

On the item for Cape Tormentine wharf Hon. Mr. Tarte moved to reduce the amount from twenty-five thousand dollars to ten thousand which was all the department could spend this year.

Just at the last moment the government played a card it had in its sleeve against the rejection of its Drummond County deal by the Senate. Hon. Mr. Fielding did the trick by laying on the table further supplementary estimates for 1897 and '98, headed Intercolonial railway extension to Montreal to pay rental to the Grand Trunk Railway and Drummond County Railway companies for a railway from Chaudiere Junction to Montreal to be operated as part of the Intercolonial Railway for nine months \$157,500. This will be added to the supply bill so that the Senate cannot reject it without throwing out the bill as a whole.

A VERY SUDDEN DEATH

Prominent Bank Official Drops Dead From His Horse's Back.

FREDERICTON, June 24.—W. R. Racy, agent of the Merchants Bank of Halifax here, just before six o'clock last evening, as he was returning from a horse-back ride suddenly dropped from his saddle to the ground dead. He had been a sufferer from heart disease for some years and that was undoubtedly the cause of his death.

QUEEN'S JUBILEE IN IRELAND.
Counter Demonstrations by the Parnellites—Black Flag Hoisted.

LONDON, June 22, midnight.—The Jubilee was celebrated in almost all parts of Ireland with enthusiasm, by public official fetes, decorations, illuminations and bonfires. The Parnellites, however, were very busy with counter demonstrations. In Dublin a procession went through the streets carrying a black flag and a coffin labelled "The British Empire," and smashing the windows of illuminated houses. The city has not been so thoroughly excited since the death of Parnell.

This evening a large meeting was held in the Dublin town hall in memory of the rebellion of '98 and speeches were made glorifying the men who were the heroes of that movement.

At Cork the national societies hung out black flags and attempted to hoist one on the municipal flagstaff, though the police interfered. Tonight the hill tops are ablaze with bonfires.

At Limerick the police removed black flags from the town hall and from a number of public monuments. During the evening John Daly addressed a small hostile demonstration. As against this the Royal Irish regiment held a military tattoo and there were several torchlight processions.

DUBLIN, June 22.—About the time that the jubilee procession started in London this morning a black flag was hoisted on the flagstaff of the municipal buildings here. It was allowed to float at half mast for half an hour and then lowered and borne through the streets at the head of a procession armed with sticks, and singing "God Save Ireland." The crowd also removed and burned all the Union Jacks they could get access to and then started in the direction of Trinity College, but the police drove them back amid great excitement.
