Says Chances For Buying Athletics Are Excellent

CHICAGO (AP)—Arnold Johnson Monday tabbed his chances of buying the Philadelphia Athletics as "excellent" and declared he was ready to spend "another \$1,000,000 for players."

The dogged efforts of the Chicago industrialist to buy the Athletics franchise from the Macks and move it to Kansas City have been a feature in one of baseball's most unusual tugs-of-war.

Johnson said in an interview that his offer of \$3,375,000 to the Macks—brothers Roy and Earle, and their father, Connie—for the Philadelphia stocks "stands."

"The deal has to be a little while," he said. "But I believe my chances are excellent."

Moore May Get Next Crack At Marciano Crown

WASHINGTON (AP)—Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, in town to referee a fight, said Monday that Archie Moore, the mightiest "logical one" to get the next crack at Marciano's crown.

Moore has been beating the drums for a title go with Marciano ever since he beat his most persistent challenger, Harold Johnson.

Chicago Sports Writer Asked To Prove Charges

CHICAGO (AP)—A Chicago sports writer, who has started an "expose" series on the "lateral kidnapping of the entire sport of boxing by syndicate criminals," was asked to prove his charges Monday by the International Boxing Club.

In a letter to the Illinois state athletic commission, Truman Gibson, IBC secretary, said in part:

"The Chicago Daily News today carried a front sports page story entitled 'expose mob tieup with boxing game.' The conclusion of the author, Jack Mabley, is that boxing has been kidnapped by syndicate criminals."

"He states 'the czar of boxing is Frankie Carbo . . . while he states that Carbo controls boxing from New York, he also states that Chicago has a vital concern in the racket.'"

"He refers to the International Boxing Club, perhaps unaware that only domestic corporations can promote boxing and that the International Boxing Club of New York has a domestic corporation licence in that state."

"The definite conclusion that boxing is 'a racket' and the flat statement that 'the czar of boxing is Frankie Carbo' are serious allegations."

Gibson continued:

"I will . . . deny categorically Mr. Mabley's conclusions and charges, under oath."

Gibson said that "it is . . . time for irresponsible and unfounded accusations against boxing to be proved or disproved."

The dates were announced by the Canadian Figure Skating Association following its 41st annual meeting here Saturday. The association accepted applications for membership from 22 clubs, bringing to 138 the number of affiliated clubs across Canada.

Caps Come From Behind In Third To Defeat Islanders 5-3

The Fredericton Capitals strengthened their first place lead last night as they came from behind with three unanswered goals in the third period to defeat the Prince Edward Islanders 5-3 at the Forum before a good crowd. Even though the visitors won, the locals

outlasted them 37 to 24.

Nine penalties were handed out by referees Cliff Young of Fredericton and Art Perry of Charlottetown, six to the Caps and three to the Islanders. The Capitals displayed a lot of speed as they kept the Islanders badly disorganized and the majority of the first and final periods.

The visitors romped to a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Bill Stewart and Jerry Smith. Shortly after the period started, Ruck Whitlock and Lorne Hennessey blasted Plumber Craig with three successive shots but were beaten off by the capable net minder.

At 4:52 Bill Stewart picked up a short pass from Pat Powers during a scramble in front of the Island net and fired a hard knee high shot at Shirley Jim juggled it momentarily but the rubber got loose and rolled over Shirley's pad and into the net. At 7:15 mark Stewart was in on Shirley on a break-away from center ice but this time was out-guessed by the local net-minder.

Fredericton got their second goal at the 10:02 mark of the frame as Jerry Smith picked up a pass from Bob Leger during a scramble in Island territory. The only first-period goal of the encounter was a slight roughing foul between Steve Birkich and Jim Ellis of the Caps at the 13:20 mark. Each received minors for the infraction. Big Riegal Grenon, who is slated as the bad boy of the Caps, received his only penalty of the game at 15:15 on a tripping charge.

The Islanders put on the pressure with Whitlock, Leyte, Palladino and Gray in on Craig several times but were held off remarkably by the defensive tactics of the visitors. Playing-coach Joe McIntosh of the Caps was penalized less than a minute later, for hooking, but still the local squad failed to make the tie. In the second period, each shot the visitors 14-7 in the period.

At the six minute mark of the second period, the Islanders lost control of the puck at center ice and it slid just inside their blue-line. Ralph Miles pulled out for a break-away but was beat to the rubber by Shirley Jim cleared to the side and was 15 feet out of the net when Miles moved to the side, picked up the puck and shot at the open net. His shot was stopped on the crease by the outstretched stick of Danny O'Connor, who turned in a strong game for the Islanders.
