St. Dunstan's College.—The annual celebration of the festival of Ireland's patron saint at St. Dunstan's College will take place this (Friday) evening, beginning at 7.30 o'clock. A splendid programme has been prepared for the occasion.

Fatal Results.—A terrible accident happened at Vale's saw mill in Somers township, about 12 miles north of Dresden, Ont., on Monday. The boiler exploded, killing Cornell, the engineer, and three of his children, who were in the engine room at the time. The boiler was thrown over a house adjoining the mill.

Revered to Death.—The residence of Conductor Ackerman, at Milford, Ont., was burned to the ground on Monday night. Ackerman's mother, over 70 years of age, was rescued all right with the other inmates, but unharmed slipped back into the burning building for the purpose, it is supposed, of recovering some valuables, and perished in the flames.

St. Patrick's Day.—To-morrow, the festival of Ireland's patron saint, will be celebrated in right royal style by the sons and daughters of Erin throughout the Province. The members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians will assemble at their hall, Queen Street, at nine o'clock in the morning, and at half-past nine will form in procession and proceed to the Lyceum by way of Grafton and Prince streets. At the Lyceum they will join the Benevolent Irish Society, and together the societies will march along Richmond and Great George streets to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where High Mass will be celebrated and a suitable sermon preached by the Rev. Mr. McKee. After the service is concluded the procession will be re-formed and parade the principal streets of the city, proceeding from the Cathedral along Great George to Water, down Water to Parnell, up Parnell to Kent along Kent to Hillsborough, down Hillsborough to Water, along Water to Queen, and up Queen to A. O. H. Hall. Galbraith's Band will be in attendance. In the evening there will be a dramatic performance in the Lyceum, the play being "Robert Emmet." This play has been in careful rehearsal for some time past, and a splendid rendition is guaranteed. There will be concerts at Summerside, Emerald, Alberton, Souris and other places, for each and all of which splendid programmes have been prepared.
