Hayden, Fullmer Battle To Draw

NEW YORK (AP)—Jackie Hayden, a slashing Canadian lightweight, and Jay Fullmer, 21-year-old younger brother of the former world middleweight champion, battled 10 rounds to a draw Friday night in a semi-final bout at Madison Square Garden. Fullmer weighed 136½, Hayden 137 pounds. Hayden opened up an early lead with his sharp counter punches while Fullmer missed with his wild flurries. Young Jay started to come on strong in the middle rounds, opening a cut over Hayden's right eye in the fourth round. Early in the sixth, Hayden was cut along the side of the right

eye. Later, in the round a rash opened over the left eye of Fullmer. Fullmer moved out front down the stretch, sweeping the seventh, eighth and ninth rounds on two of the official cards. In the eighth Jay was forcing the action, scoring with a solid left hook to the body while 26-year-old Hayden landed sharp counter rights to the head and body. The three officials split on the last round. Judge Mike Parisi who gave the 10th to Hayden voted the Canadian from New Glasgow, N.S., who now lives in Westville a 6-4 winner. Judge Nick Gamboli called the 10th even and turned in a 5-4-1 scorecard in favor of Fullmer.

Leading the YMCA in a losing cause was MacDougall with sixteen points. The Trotters were leading 30-23 at half time and widened the gap slightly in the bottom half. Refereeing the tilt were Roy MacGonnell and George Scantlebury.

Andy Bathgate's 2-Point Lead Shrinks To One

MONTREAL (CP)—Andy Bathgate's two-point lead in the National Hockey League scoring race shrunk to one Friday with an official announcement from league headquarters that an assist was wrongly credited to the New York Rangers star.

With this change, Bathgate has 30 goals and 35 assists for a total of 65 points one more than Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion and Dickie Moore of Montreal Canadiens and Eddie Lizenberger of Chicago Black Hawks.

The NHL said the official scorer at New York reported an assist for Bathgate was entered on the official score sheet by error Feb. 11. Defenceman Bill Gadsby's name should have been entered.

Alberta Edges N.B. 8-6 To Win Curling Ch'ship

CALGARY (CP)—Alberta came from behind Friday night to edge New Brunswick 8-6 and win the Canadian high school curling title. Johnny Trout's Edmonton rink finished the 11-round bonspiel with eight victories and two defeats.

The win averted a five-way tie for first place that would have existed had New Brunswick upset Trout's rink.

Trout counted one in the last end after skip Raymond MacNamara's last shot was wide on an attempted take out of an open Alberta rock.

Kwong said he had asked for his release but was told by coach Sam Lyle he wouldn't be traded "just because I want a change."

Packers' Coach Is Unhappy Over Duncan's Choice

NEWARK NJ (CP)—Vince Lombardi, head coach of Green Bay Packers, was bitter when asked to comment Friday on the bolt by Randy Duncan, the Packers' No. 1 National Football League draft choice, to British Columbia Lions.

"Obviously Duncan didn't have the confidence to play in our league," Lombardi said at Newark airport during a trip to the eastern U. S.

The Packers had given Duncan, an all-America quarterback, "the best offer we possibly could give—even a little more."

"Our offer was as good as any first draft choice could get," Lombardi said in a statement released by the club's office in Green Bay, Wis. "Naturally, we feel bad."

Duncan, now on active army duty signed with Lions of the Western Interprovincial Football Union for a reported \$35,000 for two years.
