Election Appeals. OTTAWA, Oct. 23. Appeals have been presented for hearing at the October term of the Supreme Court of Canada, which opens here on Tuesday. The election cases are Prince and Queen's (P. E. I.), King's, Shelburne, Annapolis, Pictou, Inverness, Lunenburg and Antigonish (N. S.). The appeals are from the judgments on preliminary objections.

Sad Suicide. ST. JOHN, Oct. 23. Ex-United States Consul James Murray committed suicide here yesterday by shooting himself through the head. Several attacks of grip unbalanced his mind, and the coroner's jury returned a verdict accordingly.

Terrible Gales. LONDON, Oct. 23. A terrible gale accompanied by tremendous seas, prevails at Angless Islands in the Irish Sea. The gale has also spread over a great part of England and is doing a vast amount of injury.

Horse Notes. The trotting season is practically closed, and it is more than probable that Sunol will hold the title of queen of the turf until at least next year. How much longer it would be unwise to predict. As the reader is doubtless aware, Sunol's record of 2.08 1/2 was made on a kite-shaped track, which is estimated to be from two to four seconds faster than the regulation track on which the record 2.08 1/2 by Maud S. was made, and also 2.09 by Nancy Hanks. This latter performance on a regulation oval track is looked upon as the greatest turf event of recent years. Horsemen already put forth the argument that while Sunol won a technical title to the record, the 2.09 of Nancy Hanks shows a more of more speed. In order to eclipse the work of Maud S. or Nancy Hanks, in the opinion of horsemen, Sunol should have reduced the record of 2.08 1/2 by at least two or three seconds, to allow for the difference in the tracks. Next season will, beyond question, witness some remarkable performances on the turf.

Budd Doble is the only driver that has given more than one trotter the world's record. He drove the fastest mile that had ever been trotted when he gave Dexter 2.17 1/2, his record, and Goldsmith Maid, 2.14, was the champion trotter when he gave her her record. Now it looks as though he would give Nancy Hanks a record faster than that of any other trotter. However, John Splan gave Rarus 2.13 1/2 and Johnson 2.06 1/2, their records, but as the latter is a pacer, he is not up to Doble, although the two Splan drove were the champion records when made.

His quarters were 34; 1.05 1/2, 1.40 1/2, 2.16. T. Shippes' Kilrain then trotted against U. 2.24 and made a mile in 2.22 1/2. Lady Wells, by Electioneer, went against her record of 2.27 and made the mile in 2.20 1/2. Fred Talbot's Mount Hood went against 2.26 1/2 and made a mile in 2.22 1/2. Afterwards Sunol was brought out, and as stated in THE EXAMINER of Wednesday, made the mile in 2.08 1/2. On the following day the yearling Belle Bird lowered her record, 2.27 1/2, to 2.26 1/2. Arion, by Electioneer, lowered his record, 2.15 1/2, and made a mile in 2.14 1/2. Palo Alto went against his record, 2.12 1/2, and lowered it to 2.11 1/2.

An offer of \$15,000 is said to have been made by Budd Doble and refused for Delmar, 2.11 1/2, by Mambrino, 2.21 1/2, dam by George Wilkes, 2.12. Delmar established a new stallion race record at Cambridge City, Ind., Sept. 25.

In the match race for \$3,000 at Cumberland Park, Nashville, Tennessee, on Wednesday, Direct beat Hal Pointer in three straight heats. Time, 2:10; 2:09 1/2 (the best ever made in a race in harness), and 2:11.

The New York Recorder is authority for the statement that a representative of J. B. Haggin, the California millionaire, has made an offer of \$125,000 to Charles Reed for St. Blaise, the stallion for which he paid \$100,000 at the Belmont sale on Saturday last.

It is now said that J. Malcolm Forbes, of Boston, paid exactly \$45,000 for Nancy Hanks, 2.09. She will not be sent to beat her record until next spring.
