The meeting was chaired by Mr. MacLeod who also read the minutes of the last meeting, and the financial statement. Mr. Annear delivered the president's report.

It was agreed that a new clause would be added to the constitution which would enable the organization to add two members from the Provincial

Women's Liberal Association to the executive.

Other speakers at the meeting included J. Watson MacNaught, Harvey Douglas and Hon. B. Earle MacDonald.

Premier Matheson told the group that the association was only a nucleus to hold the other Liberal associations together but that the organization could not keep going without money.

He suggested that upon payment of one dollar each member could receive a card showing that he was a member of the Liberal Association.

It was announced by E.R. Reid that the new Liberal headquarters would be located in the MacCannell Building at 142 Gt. George Street.
