

Moncton Hawks Hold St. Mary's To 5-All Tie

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 19.—(CP)—George Scholes fired a goal with three minutes of play remaining to give Moncton Hawks a 5-5 tie with Halifax St. Mary's in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight.

Saints took a 4-3 lead in the second period after a scoreless opening session and were outscored two goals to one in the last period.

The game was a close checking affair before a meagre attendance held down by one of the worst snowstorms of the winter.

Danny Horeck was the bad-man of the game, drawing two major penalties and a misconduct for fighting. He sat out a five-minute sentence in the first period after a scuffle with MacArthur and went off again in the third with another major and a misconduct when he tangled with Johnny Morrow.

Penalties played a part in the scoring. Scholes scored in the third period while Saints were two men short and the Halifaxians pumped in a pair in the second while Sandy Milne of Hawks was doing time.

Hawks opened the scoring in the second, Ronnie Rowe driving a pass from Robinson and Scholes. Halifax came back with three goals by Warwick, Ford and Watson in order.

Marshall put Hawks back into the fight but MacArthur made it 4-2 before Hamilton scored his first goal of the night.

Hamilton scored again in the third to knot the count at 4-4 and Nixon shoved the Saints ahead a minute later. Scholes fired the tying goal while Hawks were pressing with a one man advantage.

Rangers, Leafs In 3-All Tie

TORONTO, Feb. 19.—(CP)—New York Rangers came to Toronto tonight and played the Maple Leafs to a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with a goal in the last three minutes of play.

The split in points lifted Leafs into second place, one point ahead of Montreal Canadiens and boosted Rangers into the number four spot by the same margin.

Rangers led 2-1 at the end of the first period. The second frame a match sentence—was scoreless. Leafs struck for two goals in the final period but Rangers tied it up with less than three minutes left.

The game was postponed from Feb. 6 because of the King's death. Referee George Gravel cracked down on rough play in the second frame. His high sentence went to defenceman Gus Morrison of Leafs—a match penalty—for what Gravel termed a deliberate attempt to injure defenceman Hy Buller of Rangers.

Buller was knocked to the ice during a New York ganging attack and Morrison slashed him across the chest with his stick and then apparently made as if to kick him. Morrison got an automatic \$100 fine and will be suspended from further play until his case has been dealt with by league president Clarence Campbell.

Others to get more than minor penalties during the boisterous frame were Jim Thomson of Toronto (a 10 minute misconduct for arguing too strenuously about a two-minute sentence) and Rangers' Ed Kullman (five minute major for high-sticking). All told there were 16 penalties, 10 to Toronto.

Little Emile Francis did a capable job of filling the Ranger goal in place of injured Chuck Rayner. He stopped 24 shots in big league fashion and looked better than Leafs' Al Rollins.

The B. A. Oil finals will also be played at 3:30 today. A rink skipped by Alex Weir of Pictou will meet the J. S. MacDonald rink of Charlottetown in this competition.

Norwegian Sensational At Winter Olympics

OSLO, Feb. 19.—(CP)—Norway's fantastic flyer, Hjalmar Andersen, cut 11.6 seconds from his own 10,000-metre world speed-skating record today and became the first athlete in the history of the winter Olympic games to win three championships on consecutive days.

Before a wildly cheering crowd of 25,000 in Bislett Stadium, Andersen flashed over the course of 8 1/4 miles in 16 minutes, 43.8 seconds. He not only beat his own recognized world-record time of 16:57.4 but ripped 38.4 seconds from the Olympic mark of 17:24.2 set by a fellow-countryman, Ivar Ballangrud, at the 1936 Olympics in Germany.

Sunday Andersen won the 5,000-metre title, setting another Olympic record, and Monday he won the 10,000-metre race. Norwegian fans jubilantly celebrated their idol's triple win. There was little worry that Othmar Schneider of Austria stopped Norway's streak of championships by winning the men's Slalom race.

Two Norwegians placed behind Schneider, and Norway's team total in the unofficial point standings went rocketing to 94. Austria is second with 51 and the United States, but out for the third straight day, is third with 34 1/2, followed by Finland and Holland, tied with 24.

An almost sure point winner for Canada made his first appearance today. Peter Firstbrook, 18-year-old Toronto figure skater, was scored fourth in the compulsory figures the 14 entrants went through today. Dick Button, world figure skating champion, was far in front on points, as expected, and is practically a certainty to defend successfully the Olympic title he won in 1948. Helmut Seibt of Austria was second and James Grogan of Colorado Springs, Colo., third.

The final phase of the championship—the free skating—will be held Thursday.

There wasn't one North American in the first 10 placings in the 10,000-metre speed race, where Andersen made a show of the field.

Kees Brookman of Holland, Carl Erik Asplund of Sweden, and Pentti Lamio of Finland all broke the Olympic record in finishing in that order behind Andersen. But their clockings were far below his. Ralph Olin of Calgary placed 21st and Craig Mackay of Saskatoon 24th.

Rail Brakeman Wins No. Ontario Curling Title

SUDBURY, Ont., Feb. 19.—(CP)—The rink skipped by Jimmy Guy, six-foot-one Canadian Pacific Railway brakeman from Kenora, became Northern Ontario's representative in the Dominion Curling Association finals at Winnipeg next month when Copper Cliff's Hughie Munro upset Tom Ramsay of Kirkland Lake 6-5 today.

Ramsay, who won the Canadian title in 1950, needed a win over Munro and another over Guy to force a tie with the tall Kenora skip, but he missed by a whisker on a last-end take-out try.

Guy had defeated Ramsay in their first meeting Monday in an extra end which, couple with two wins over Munro, gave him three victories against no defeats. His records since entering club play—down competition at Kenora is 16 wins and three setbacks.

Members of Guy's rink are veteran Jack Pike, playing third; and rookies Leo Fregeau and Ray Parnell, playing second and lead respectively.

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Saskatchewan Sets Pace At Moncton 'Spiel

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 19.—(CP)—Saskatchewan's pace-setting entry in the Dominion curling bonsel tonight downed Northern Ontario 13-4 to extend its undefeated string to five games.

The western rink, only four-some undefeated after five rounds of play, trounced Prince Edward Island 14-2 in fourth-round play earlier today. The bonsel ends Thursday.

Other fifth-round winners were Nova Scotia, Quebec, Manitoba and New Brunswick.

Manitoba had won four games to one lost, Ron Gray's squad bowing 16-7 to Alberta in the fourth round. Quebec, Albertin New Brunswick and Nova Scotia each won three and lost two.

Ontario fared the worst, losing all five games. British Columbia won two and lost three. Prince Edward Island and Northern Ontario had only one win each.

Gary Thode's Saskatchewan crew, defending Dominion champs from Saskatoon Tech, remained invincible throughout the first five rounds. There is only one change in their lineup from the rink that won the Sifton Trophy at Nelson, B. C. last year.

Doug Conn is replacing Orest Hryniuk at second. The other boys, Gary Cooper and Roy Hufsmith as well as the skip, provincial champs for the second successive year, have been together for three seasons, since they were in grade IX.

Ron Gray's Manitoba four remained undefeated until they tangled with Alberta's stalwarts in the fourth round. Shaken slightly by that setback, they managed to squeak an 8-7 win over Prince Edward Island in the fifth.

P. E. Island fared the worst of the "far east" provinces. In general, this was a good day for the Maritimes—both Nova Scotia and Y. W. Brunswick both winning two games. Newfoundland is the only province not represented in the annual stone-throwing contest.
