

# Yankees And White Sox Win; Redlegs Beat Cubs

New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox rallied for victories Tuesday to stay two games apart in the American League pennant race while Cincinnati temporarily moved into a virtual first place tie with Milwaukee in the National League.

The Redlegs blew a five-run lead built up by Wally Post's grand slam homer, then bounced back to defeat Chicago Cubs, 8-6, with two runs in the 10th inning. The victory gave Cincinnati a .581 percentage to .583 for Milwaukee, which played St. Louis in one of two night games on the NL schedule.

Brooklyn was at New York in the other Philadelphia and Pittsburgh were not scheduled. The first place Yankees twice came from behind and finally stopped the pesky Baltimore Orioles, 6-4 on a two-run double by Gil McDougald in the 11th for sixth straight success. Larry Doby's three-run homer in the eighth did the trick for the White Sox, 4-2, over Detroit as Billy Pierce won the AL's biggest win, with 11 scattered five hits for his first triumph since June 8.

**BOSTON WON**  
Boston defeated Washington 2-1 with Sammy White driving in both runs to take third place in the American League by a .005 percentage over Cleveland, idle along with Kansas City.

Whitey Ford, who returned to action for the first time in six weeks Monday night, picked up his second relief victory in less than 24 hours for New York against Baltimore. The veteran lefthander (4-1) pitched the last four innings and allowed three hits and one run.

Brooklyn left Ken Lehman as the loser, although McDougald's game-winning hit came off George Zvernick, who lost when Mickey Mantle hit him for an extra-inning homer Monday.

The game drew 24,293 fans, largest crowd for a non-holiday weekday Baltimore history.

Frank Lary, losing his 10th against four wins, held a 2-1 lead for the Tigers until Doby, apparently off on his annual mid-summer tear, hammered his seventh homer following singles by Pierce and Minnie Minoso. Pierce had started five times and had lost four since he won his 10th against Baltimore nearly a month ago. Detroit's only earned run was Frank Bolling's 10th home run.

**THREE HITS**  
The Red Sox were held to three hits by loser Camilo Pascual and Russ Kemmerer. But White, who has taken to wearing glasses while batting, came through twice in the clutch. In the fifth, Jackie Jensen doubled and scored on White's single.

In the seventh, Jensen walked, got to third on Frank Malzone's single and scored on White's sacrifice fly to right. Frank Sullivan allowed six hits and struck out eight to make his record 7-5 and give Boston a 12-4 record for its home stand.

Home runs by Lee Walls and Ernie Banks plus a single run in the seventh boosted the Cubs into a 6-5 lead after Cincinnati had scored five times in the second inning. Four crossed on Post's 11th homer and his second of the season with the bases loaded.

Ed Bailey's eighth-inning home run, his 11th, tied the score and the Reds wrapped it up with two in the 10th. Don Hoak doubling for one run and a walk to Johnny Temple forcing in the other. Hal Samer won over Jim Brosnan, both in relief.

The Cubs' Walls had a single, double, triple and homer in five trips to become the first major leaguer to hit for the cycle since Don Mueller of the Giants did it against Pittsburgh on July 11, 1954.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Von McDaniel, 18-year-old bonus rookie,

pitched six innings of perfect no-hit ball Tuesday night and then lost his magic but the St. Louis Cardinals went on to knock Milwaukee out of first place 4-2. The Milwaukee loss boosted Cincinnati into first place, half a game ahead of the Braves.

The Redlegs had defeated Chicago in an afternoon game. The Cardinals triumph left them in third place, a game behind Cincinnati and half a game behind the Braves.

McDaniel, the high school boy signed by the Cards a little over a month ago, retired the first 18 men to face him. He had 29,211 fans, largest crowd of the season at Busch Stadium, sitting on the edges of their seats.

But he appeared to tire in the seventh and quickly yielded four hits and the two runs. He gave up a total of five hits in gaining his fourth straight triumph but needed help from reliever Hoyt Wilhelm.

The Cardinals victory was at the expense of a one-time nemesis, Warren Spahn.

NEW YORK (AP)—Forty-year-old Sal Maglie fired a four-hitter Monday night as Brooklyn Dodgers blanked New York Giants, 6-0. It was Maglie's third victory and his first complete game since his first start of the season April 18 against Pittsburgh.

Out with a sore thumb since he made his last appearance in a May 30 doubleheader against the Pirates, Maglie retired his ex-mates in order in six of the nine innings and did not permit a runner to reach third.

He struck out three and did not walk a batter in giving Brooklyn a sweep of its two-game neighborhood set with the Giants, both by shutouts. The Giants, hottest club in the National League during their swing through the West, have now failed to score in their last 22 innings while losing three in a row.

# Boston-Ch'town Boxers Due Today For Thursday Fight

Their strenuous days of training behind them the principal combatants for tomorrow night's exciting boxing card at the City Sports Arena will arrive in the City this afternoon to await the gong which will send them into the ring in a boxing match that has an appealing international flavor.

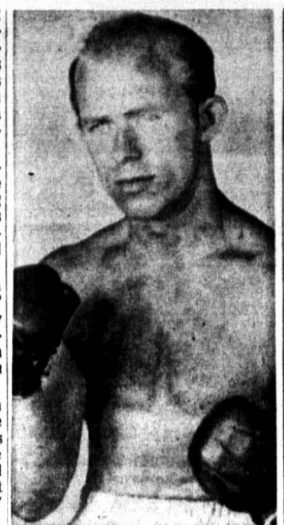
Billy Mays and Dick Hall fighting out of Boston and bearing the reputation of the toughest boxing circles in the New England States will arrive around four o'clock accompanied by their managers and a train of followers.

Sometimes during the afternoon Cobby McCloskey and Don "Duck" Trainer will motor into the City from their training camp in Halifax where both boys have been working out for several weeks in preparation for this big fight.

McCloskey goes against tough Dick Hall, a young slugger in one round bout while Trainer pits his skill against the ring-wise Billy Mays in another ten round fight. The fighters will work out at the Arena tonight around 7 o'clock.

Boxing critics are waiting anxiously to see these men but excitement is becoming keener as fight fans what their appetites on the tantalizing thoughts of seeing two fights of ten rounds on the same card. Not for nearly 20 years has such a fight been presented to Island fight followers.

And also becoming increasing clearer is the international aspect

of the fight Already Boston followers of Mays and Hall have indicated to fight officials here that neither of the Charlottetown boys, McCloskey or Trainer have much chance of going the limit.

Boxing Manager Clem Crowley accompanied by Mrs. Crowley is

bringing his fighters here. Sam Silverman, the leading Boston fight promoter and Mrs. Silverman are arriving today for the fight and word has it that Silverman, who is sweet on Dick Hall, wants to see his boy dispose of McCloskey. On short order for Silverman has plans of pushing the young Hall up the ladder for a crack at the Middleweight championship within the next two years.

The rising Hall will meet a seasoned veteran when he goes against McCloskey. During the past decade Cobby has carved out quite a reputation with his gloved hands and these include two victories over the highly rated Yvon Durelle.

Cobby decided Durelle in 1950 to win the Maritime Middleweight title and four years later he reached another highlight of his career when he fought Pauley Griffin in Madison Square Garden. He was the second born Islander to fight in the garden, the first being his brother Ace.

In his last Charlottetown appearance he took a split decision over Jimmy Skinner of New York. Cobby last fought here in July, 1955.

A leading contender for the Maritime Middleweight Championship Cobby has been working out under the guidance of brother Tom in Halifax and a victory over the 20 year Hall tomorrow night would go along way in advancing the career of 27 year old Cobby McCloskey.

### Pencil Can Cause More Trouble Than Fourteen Clubs

NEW YORK (AP)—The United States Golf Association last winter put teeth into the rule requiring accurate scorecards and he first person tipped was Jackie Pung.

The jovial Hawaiian was shown the title after she apparently had won the U.S. Women's National Open Championship. It was discovered that she and her playing partner, Betty Jameson, had put down four for each other on the fourth hole of the final round when each took a six.

It was an excusable mistake. Each player, wrapped up in her own troubles, probably figured the other took only a five, and so marked it on the card.

Their totals were correct, the big scoreboard showed the correct score for the hole in question, and hundreds following the contestants knew the right figures. There was no attempt to deceive, defraud, or otherwise sneak in through a backdoor.

But a rule is a rule, and in the eyes of the USGA, if it interfered with justice, it was just too bad for justice. The penalty was disqualification in this case, and the championship won by Mrs. Pung was given to Betty Rawls.

Last year in the National Open Jackie Burke, then Master's champion, signed a faulty card, as did Gil Cavanaugh. Each was penalized two strokes, instead of being disqualified. There was some criticism of that ruling, as it was unprecedented. So the rule was changed making disqualification mandatory.

Now the USGA is being criticized for enforcing the new rule. What should be done?

One solution might be to take the scoring of the really important matches as important tournaments out of the hands of the players and entrust it to official score keepers.

## Ford Frick Announces The All-Star Starting Lineups

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball commissioner Ford Frick Sunday announced the starting lineups—other than the pitchers—of the American and National league all-star teams for the July 9 game at St. Louis.

As expected the National League team is composed of five Cincinnati players and Stan Musial, New York, Willie Mays of New York and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee.

Musial, Mays and Aaron are the three players Frick named Friday in disregarding a deluge of late Cincinnati ballots in the fan poll.

Two Cincinnati of the Boston Red Sox and Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees head the American leaguers.

Anderson, Texas industrialist and former secretary of the navy, thus may take over the cabinet post any time he takes the oath. No effective date for Humphrey's resignation has been announced.

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## O'Malley Doesn't Know If Dodgers Will Go To L.A.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Walter O'Malley, president of Brooklyn Dodgers, told Congress "I do not know" whether the Dodgers will shift to Los Angeles next year.

O'Malley made the statement to the House anti-trust subcommittee. That group is looking into the proposed move of the Dodgers and New York Giants to Los Angeles and San Francisco, respectively.

In its study of professional sports operations in Los Angeles, O'Malley testified it depends on the results of New York Mayor Robert Wagner's studies of the situation and on whether Los Angeles will be ready for major baseball next spring.

Earlier, Leslie M. O'Connor, president of the Pacific Coast League, testified that probably five of the league's eight teams will have to move if the Dodgers and Giants go to the west coast.

"I don't know where they can move to," he said.

If the Dodgers go to Los Angeles and the Giants to San Francisco, O'Connor said, not only will those two Pacific Coast League clubs be displaced but also certainly Hollywood because of its proximity to Los Angeles.

"I think the Sacramento club would be put off of business by San Francisco.

"Then San Diego would be isolated from the clubs in the north." Another witness was New York city council president Abe Stark, who called on Congress to investigate "the unholy alliance between the baseball barons and the pay-television forces."
