

Eden's Resignation Was Top Surprise Of The Week

With startling suddenness Sir Anthony Eden bowed to his critics and his own shattered health. There was no advance warning. When the prime minister and Lady Eden went down to see the Queen at Sandringham Tuesday London political writers viewed the visit as without significance. On Wednesday the scene was swiftly transformed. Her Majesty made a hasty unheralded return to the capital. The cabinet met. The government ministers below cabinet rank were called in. Then the traditional visit of the prime minister to Buckingham Palace. It was all over for Eden.

Everyone speculated on why R. A. Butler No. 2 man in the Eden cabinet was passed by. Macmillan was an enthusiastic supporter of intervention in Egypt while Butler was thought to have been lukewarm. Perhaps it went back to the pre-war period. Then Churchill Eden Salisbury Macmillan all were conspicuous anti-appeasers. Butler was closely associated with Neville Chamberlain's efforts to come to terms with the dictators.

HEALTH BROKEN

The immediate cause of Eden's resignation was medical advice. His health broken under the strain of the Egyptian crisis four eminent doctors issued a bulletin saying he could no longer carry the heavy burden of office. There were symptoms of a return of the serious abdominal condition for which he was operated on 3 1/2 years ago.

REFINERY BLAZE

In Montreal East a flat sparsely-settled area on the fringes of Canada's largest city the refineries of five big oil companies stretch side by side. They process into gasoline and other products the crude oil that flows through the pipeline from Portland Me. The Shell refinery alone covers 320 acres.

Tuesday morning residents of the district were awakened by a blast which eye witnesses said looked like color pictures of atomic bomb tests. Some thought there had been an earthquake. Part of the Shell refinery's tank farm was afire. All day oil-fled flames leapt toward the sky visible 20 miles away. Six tanks four with a capacity of 50,000 barrels each and four with 25,000-barrel capacity were destroyed. Company officials said the damage would amount to more than \$1,000,000.

PARLIAMENT MEETS

A new session of Parliament, the last before next summer's general election, got under way Tuesday. One of the chief items of business will be legislation allocating more than \$100,000,000 for culture and education.

The long-delayed Canada Council for arts, humanities and social sciences will be set up, endowed with \$100,000,000. Half this sum will be earmarked for the universities for new buildings. Scholarships will be a big item in its position of the other \$50,000,000 in addition, annual grants to the

Grand Jury On Jail Conditions

Conditions at the Queen's County Jail were the subject of comment in the report submitted to the Supreme Court by the Grand Jury yesterday. The report, which was signed on behalf of the jurors by foreman Leonard MacDonald, read as follows:

"Your Lordship: We, Grand Jurors January Assizes 1957, beg to submit the following report on our visit to the public institutions:

"Our only visit was to the County Jail due to road conditions, weather.

"Was...rooms need to be repainted after repairs are made to brick and cement work. Unsanitary conditions are evident throughout the building for lack of repair. Trap in sewer line is open creating a hazard to inmates and

staff and a constant source of contamination. Tables should be used in eating room and shelves should be removed as they cannot be kept clean.

"A new urinal should be put in the wash-room.

"Kitchen ceiling should be plastered and painted.

"The women's quarters need a new wall around the bath-room as

the walls are full of holes.

"Regardless of the above, we urgently recommend new quarters situated on the Falconwood property so as to get some use of the prisoners by having them assist with the work on the Farm, thereby reducing the cost to the Province for their upkeep.
