THE Sultan is about to pay an official visit to the Czar. The spectacle of these two natural enemies hobnobbing and exchanging professions of eternal friendship will be about as convincing as the kisses of two rival belles.

In order to carry his pet tobacco bill, Prince Bismarck created an Economic Council, but that body has now turned upon its creator and defeated the measure by an almost unanimous vote. The Chancellor is said to feel his defeat very keenly.

ASSESSMENT ACT.—Remember the Y. M. C. A. Debating Club meets in their Hall, this evening, at eight o'clock, sharp, to discuss the question: "Would the Local Government be justified at present in repealing the Assessment Act. To be opened by S. S. Peterson, Esq."

DURING the month of February 2,625 emigrants left the Clyde. Of the total number, 2,175 were for the United States, 391 for Australia, 33 for New Zealand, and 26 for other places. Among the departures for the United States were 1,288 foreigners, chiefly Germans. In the returns were also included a number of refugee Jews from Southern Russia.

NOTWITHSTANDING the American competition which caused Swiss watchmakers great anxiety not long ago, their trade has been prosperous of late, and wages have been large for Switzerland. But the financial crash in Paris and heavy losses in Vienna have affected the industry, and large orders for the French and Austrian markets have been countermanded.

BENEVOLENT.—On Friday evening next a benefit will be given by the "Band of Citizens' Skating Rink," to the Keeper, Mr. Cummings. The Band of the 82nd Battalion will be in attendance from 8 to 10 o'clock. With a good sheet of ice we hope to see a large attendance. A SPECIAL first-class emigrant car left Pictou for Manitoba and points in the West on Tuesday. Some 25 passengers got on board at Pictou, 15 joined at New Glasgow and St. Lawrence, and on leaving Truro the train had on board more than 50 emigrants. Of the Pictou County emigrants 25 were bound for Manitoba and 15 for points in Montana and California. Another emigrant car leaves New Glasgow for Manitoba on the 3rd of April.—New Glasgow Eastern Chronicle.

MR. COSTIGAN has given notice of a motion on the Irish question. It asks the Dominion House of Commons to renew the expression of their loyalty and devotion to Her Majesty's person and Government, and then sets forth:

(1) That the present condition of Ireland has been observed with regret; (2) that Irishmen in Canada are among the most loyal and prosperous subjects; (3) that the Dominion has not received its proper share of the Irish emigration because of estrangement towards the Imperial Government; (4) that it is desirable that this should not continue; (5) that Ireland should be given a similar form of self-government to that existing in the Provinces of Canada; (6) that clemency be extended by Her Majesty to persons now imprisoned for political offences.

THE BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA.—His Lordship Bishop Binney, to-morrow, completes the thirty first anniversary of his consecration. There are very few, if any, prelates of the English Church now alive who have held the office for so great a length of time, and great have been the changes, not only in this Province and Dominion but the world over, during that long period. His Lordship has identified himself so thoroughly with all our institutions of public utility, charitable and religious, that we trust he may long be spared to the city and Province. A Nova Scotian by birth he has ever been loyal to his native land; while his admirable administration of the very responsible and arduous duties of the Episcopate has proved him to be worthy of the Church's highest honors.—Halifax Herald, March 24.

AT a regular meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Irish National Land League, held on Monday evening, the 27th March, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we express our deep regret for the death of the deceased gentleman, whose kindly heart manifested a warm interest in the efforts which were made by the tenant farmers of this Island to become freeholders.

Resolved, That we tender our sincere condolences to his sorrowing widow and relatives in their deep affliction. Be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to his widow, and published in the city papers.

Local and Other Items.

THE Royal Arcanum meets to night at 8 30 p. m.

LAST year it cost the Lord Mayor of London \$100,000 above his \$50,000 allowance to pull through the civic year.

THE total population of Germany is 45,234,061. The excess of females over males is 836,195. The increase in population since 1876 is 2,506,689.

THE "Northern Light" left Georgetown at six o'clock this morning, and at two o'clock this forenoon the station master at Georgetown reported her passing Cape Bear, in open water, steaming towards Pictou.

THE annual report of the London Peabody Trust shows the net gain for the year to have been almost \$150,000. It has now provided for the artisan and laboring class 6,160 rooms, exclusive of bath-rooms, laundries, and wash-houses. The trustees show in their report that the fund has been expended strictly in accordance with the donor's expressed wishes.

MANY regiments in the British army have jets, and the Emiskillen Fusiliers brought from India, in 1876, an antelope, which made a host of friends at Colchester, Portsmouth, and Preston, where the regiment has been quartered. But as soon as the regiment reached Emiskillen, Ireland (whence it has its name), their pet was shot. A circumstance of this sort gives rise to unspeakable bitterness, and is quite likely to lead to trouble.

WE may not be able to boast at the present day of our Joans of Arc or our Boadices, but we can boast of women in a humbler sphere, equally brave. Among them must be counted a Mrs. Martin Smith, who has just been honored with a medal and diploma of the Sovereign Order of St. John of Jerusalem for bravery in the Transvaal war. She attended the wounded throughout the battle of Broeker's Spruit, and even after being badly struck by a ball herself, tore her dress into strips for bandages.

WE are pleased to learn that Mr. Angus McLean, youngest son of the late Alexander McLean, has passed a highly satisfactory examination before the College of Physicians and Surgeons, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, and received the degree of Doctor of Medicine. Mr. McLean has received several invitations to practice in some cities of California, one of which, we understand, he is about to accept. We congratulate Dr. McLean and wish him every success in his chosen profession.

THE Patriot, with Mr. McMillan, grumbles because the Stock Farm Commissioners recently disposed of three horses, advancing in age, for \$480, and purchased three young and more valuable horses instead for \$399. "Horse swappers," "unsound traders," must the Commissioners be when they thus transact the business so ably, and so well. We hope, no doubt, that the men who purchased horses from the Government are more than satisfied with them. The Patriot and Mr. McMillan, however, are not. What a pity!

A WRINKLE FOR FIREMEN.—Washington firemen are trying the experiment of shooting arrows with life-lines attached as fire escapes. An arrow, with the coil of a line attached, was easily thrown over a flag-staff eighty feet high. It is said that with a little practice any fireman would be able to throw the line into a window seventy-five feet above the pavement, or throw a small ball of twine as high as the Washington monument. The twine would support the weight of 100 feet of rope, which would support a t. n. Archery will probably become quite popular among the Washington firemen.

THE WEATHER FOR APRIL.—Professer John Walker Adams, of Toronto, submits to the criticism of the Canadian and American press the following forecast of the weather for next month:—April 1st—Wet and somewhat windy. 2nd—Cloudy to fair weather. 3rd and 4th—Stormy and threatening. 5th—Wet and stormy. 9th and 10th—Changeable. 11th—Cloudy but fair. 12th—Fair. 13th and 14th—Stormy, with some rain. 17th and 18th—Fair. 19th till 22nd—Changeable, with some rain. 23rd—Stormy, with little rain. 29th—Fair. There will be a heavy storm on the Atlantic coast on April 13th, and May 2nd. May enters cloudy and stormy.

By a despatch from a student of McGill University last evening to one of its old students, we learn that the Island boys in the Faculty of Medicine have done exceedingly well during the session just closed. Of the five young gentlemen attending, all have come out in honors—a very difficult standing to get. To give some idea of the difficulty, during the session of 1880-81, forty-six students went up for their primary examination, ten were rejected and four only received honors. The primary examination is passed at the end of the second year, and this is the one our boys have done so well in. Their names are Arch. McLeod, B. A., son of Captain McLeod, Orwell, Alexander McNeill, formerly of Dr. Taylor's of this city, George Carruthers, Kensington, F. D. Walker, Mount Stewart, and N. McDonald, Grand River.
