Not So Nonsensical After All.

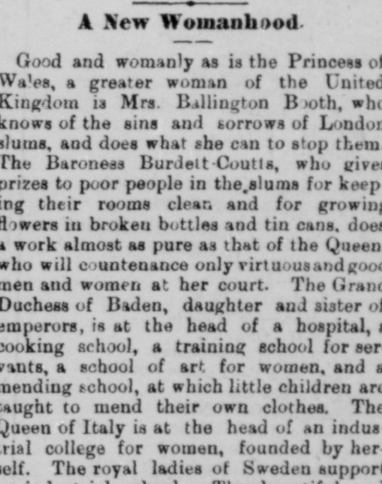

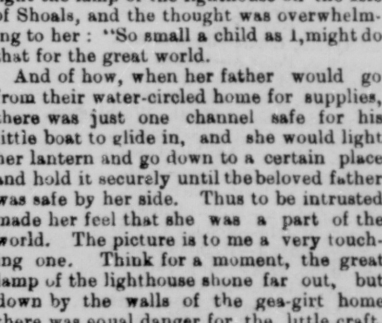

A New Womanhood.

Good and womanly as is the Princess of Wales, a greater woman of the United Kingdom is Mrs. Ballington Booth, who knows the aims and sorrows of London slums, and does what she can to stop them. The Baroness Burlet-Coutts, who gives prizes to poor people in the slums for keeping their rooms clean and for growing flowers in broken bottles and tin cans, does a work almost as pure as that of the Queen, who will countenance only virtuous and good men and women at her court. The Grand Duchess of Baden, daughter and sister of emperors, is at the head of a hospital, a cooking school, a training school for servants, a school of art for women, and a mending school, at which little children are taught to mend their own clothes. The Queen of Italy is at the head of an industrial college for women, founded by herself. The royal ladies of Sweden support as possible the peculiar noise she makes. The lad quickly returned for his rifle, and without saying anything as to where he was going, started off in his canoe alone, and getting within easy shot of his game, succeeded in killing it. Lake Moosehead is the principal headwaters of the Kennebec River, and large quantities of pine, spruce and cedar timber are annually sent to the seaboard from this country. In the many lakes and rivers in the vicinity good fishing can be had; and the opening of the Canadian Pacific Railway gives facilities for travel to the many tourists who visit here during the summer months. Large hotels have been erected near the principal stations, and cities and houses are built on many of the lands in the lake. I learned that the lumber alone for one of these club houses cost \$1700. After leaving Moosehead Lake, we pass Long Pond and Indian Lake and then reach Hoeb station. Here are extensive saw mills and a considerable business in lumber activity. But excepting at one or two places of a similar character, the country is a dreary one to look upon; mile after mile without a single habitation, except some dismantled hut that formerly had been a lumber shanty.

And "for father" meant for mother too, and the home. So that this incident in the life of one of our sweetest American poets has a thought for every young woman who determines to be helpful to those about her. For often the "lower lights" need attention most; the humble channel where perhaps but one may come, needs the love that is faithful, the hand that is true and steady.

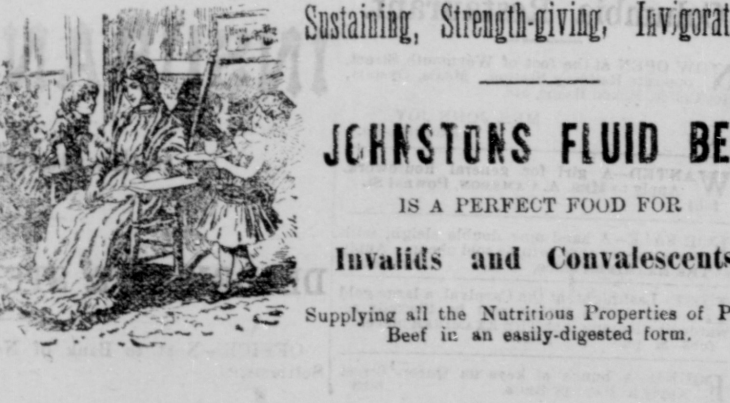
