New Canadian Record Is Set At Falconwood

A new all-time Canadian record for two-year-old cows was set recently by a Falconwood Farm heifer Royalty Valentine Colanhus.

The Holstein Journal says the heifer has a Plan B senior 2-year-old, 305-day record of 17,499 pounds of milk, 4.67 percent, 713 pounds fat which is 182 percent of the breed class average in milk and 202 percent in fat.

This, says the Journal, is a higher fat record than has ever been made on Plan A in the class for all time in Canada.

Plan A calls for milk to be weighed at every milking each day. Plan B permits owner to weigh the milk at selected periods.

It eliminates the work of weighing at every milking and also eliminates a lot of book keeping which such continuous weighing makes necessary.

The heifer was bred by G. Claude Smith of East Royalty who is now director of town planning. She was first two-year old in milk at the Maritime Winter Fair in 1957. Her sire was Valentine Duke who is a son of Lewisdale Duke of Mark bred by Lewis Brothers, York Valentine Duke was bred by Aeneas McIntyre of Bedford Station.

Smith also bred the heifer's dam, Royalty Colanhus (VG) who was a daughter of Colanhus Esquire who was out of the 1-134-pound cow Rose Colanhus Vale (VG).

Delegate Tells Conference Of Island Seed Potatoes

Prince Edward Island seed potatoes are shipped to every province in Canada and 15 other countries of the world, William MacLennan, chairman of the Island's potato marketing board said in Winnipeg recently.

One of the chief speakers at the third Canadian potato industry conference held in the Manitoba capital the latter part of August, Mr. MacLennan informed the delegates of the conference that the Island province this year expected to ship seed from some 40,000 acres, 70 per cent of which was planted with Sebagoes.

The local government, federal officials and Island farmers had all co-operated in the establishment of this important Island industry which started with two experimental shipments in 1918, he said.

Dept. Of Agriculture Apiarist Says Thick, Clear Honey Best

A word to the wise (wives). With fresh honey about to make its appearance in volume on local markets; the Canada Department of Agriculture offers this family tip to consumers: When purchasing directly from the producer, make sure the honey is thick and clear, thin, watery honey should be rejected even if offered at low prices. Honey sold through commercial or retail outlets must be graded and bear the name of the producer or packer, but honey sold over-the-back-fence or bought directly from the beekeeper need not be graded.

EARLY HONEY — Honey harvested early may have a high moisture content and be liable to ferment or sour, warns the Brandon, Man., experimental farm, but most beekeepers extract the honey only when the combs are three quarter or fully sealed.

Under these conditions, the fresh honey will have a low moisture content and will likely be graded number one. Grading is based on moisture content and not honey color.

Roadside stands can be used to advantage in the sale of honey. While few Canadian beekeepers use them, they have proved effective in the United States.
