...sold under Federal Government contract. The industry felt that it could do better if it operated independently of the government.

...*They priced themselves right out of the market," said Mr. Forrie. He suggested that the industry now admits it had made an error and seeks government assistance.

...*Walter Dinsdale (PC - Brandon) said taxation is drawing off almost one-third the national income and is resulting in loss of productivity as well as threatening the development of business. Government spending was contributing to inflation.

...*Floor In Name Only — Mr. Argue said he hopes that if a floor price is fixed for cheese it will be adequate to cover costs of production.

...*We now have floor prices in name only," he said. While there was a floor price of 38 cents a dozen for eggs, farmers in Saskatchewan were getting about 14 cents a dozen. A floor price of \$26 for 100 pounds had been established for pork, but Western farmers were getting as little as \$14.

...*Referring to the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease, Mr. Argue called for compensation to farmers other than those who actually have livestock destroyed. The new outbreak in his constituency meant that farmers would not be able to use a community pasture this year and would be faced with the need to buy feed for their cattle.

...*In connection with family allowances in this Province, Mr. Claxton said he rang Premier Jones up by long-distance early in February, 1952, to ask him if he thought it would be all right if they started the plan here, as they wanted to get a place where there were very intelligent people, and which was not too large.

...*The Premier's reply was characteristic," Mr. Claxton added. "He said that 'any time the Federal Government wants to start anything here that means more money for Prince Edward Island, you can start any day you like. So we sent a team in here and had the cooperation of the whole community in starting it off."

...*He went on to point out that while less than five percent of the Federal taxes are collected from the Maritimes, rather more than 10 percent is paid out in family allowances in this area.

...*The response of Prince Edward

Island to the requirements of men has measured up to the splendid record this Province has always had," the Minister said. He recalled that in the First World War he had the privilege of serving in the artillery, in which many Islanders had served, and mentioned particularly Col. Prowse, Colonel Peake, and Bus Matheson who had been his own section commander.

The Minister gave a comprehensive picture of Canada's contribution to the defense of Korea and Europe. He recalled his own recent visit to the Far East, and mentioned two Prince Edward Islanders, Naval Lieutenant Peter Cosh and Lt.-Col. Leith Crue, whom he met and whose work he commended highly.

"Canada now has close to 8,000 officers and men in the Korean brigade, and they are second to none," he said. "They are well up to the best we have had fighting for us at any time." About 13,000 Canadians have already taken part in the fighting in the Far East. A total of over 30,000 Canadians have served outside of Canada since Korea. This was in addition to the heavy air-lift squadron which have done a great job, making trips of over four million miles without serious accident.

Mr. Claxton also referred to Canada's 27th Infantry in Germany and to the Air Force Squadron in England.

In addition to the increase of over 300 percent in the fighting forces since Korea, the cost of guns, planes and other equipment, owing to the increasing complexity of modern armament, has gone up tremendously. The Minister cited some impressive figures in this connection.

...*Co-ordinated Plans — He went on to describe optimistically the results achieved in coordination between the free nations in preventing another world war.

...*Most of the countries, he explained, are operating on a three-year programme to bring into existence, sometime in 1954, the forces which it is believed are required for world security. Already the accession of strength has been such as to enable General Eisenhower to speak with great confidence of the situation.

...*"Not only are we working to an agreed plan," Mr. Claxton emphasized, "but we are beginning to work as a team. This is a new thing in the history of the world. It has never been even tried before."

...*"While people may be upset by the delays, the fact that we have made progress is the significant thing. We have had almost three extra years in which to plan, and our hope is—and it is a pretty confident hope—that if we all carry out our programmes, by 1954 or 1955 we will be able to level off at what we consider each country should do, and with the minimum required for security."

...*"This has meant a big drain on our manpower, but the programme in Canada has had support from every part of the country. Here in this Island you have had some very famous units which have made names for themselves in two world wars. They deserve your support now!"

...*Plane Delayed — Mr. Claxton's plane was delayed for nearly an hour owing to the air accident at Summerside, and as a result the reception which was to have preceded the dinner was dispensed with. The Minister reviewed the composite Guard of Honour, however, on his arrival at the hotel.

...*At the Charlottetown airport, he and Mrs. Claxton were met by Premier Jones and Mrs. Jones, Mayor Stewart and Mrs. Stewart, Brig G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., Col. J. H. Shaw, Mr. Gordon MacDon-

...*caught on the way up hopelessly stranded in the bottom compartment of the ladder.

...*Kings County has been gradually usurping the laurels from Prince County in respect to its trout population. Last season Kings was definitely tops as a trout producer and this season it left off last year. It is this columnist's conviction that West Prince has been experiencing a falling off in its trout population for at least three years while Kings has shown a marked improvement. At the moment I am not going to comment on causes that could lead to such a situation.

...*Black ducks and pheasants have commenced laying and methinks that some ducks are already incubating clutches of eggs. I am in hopes of seeing broods of black ducks earlier than May 24th if the crows, skunks, raccoons, etc., do not raid them first. Foxes are not rated as egg hunters but appear to prefer their eggs in the meat stage. Crows and skunks on the other hand are inveterate egg hunters. Skunks when full fed will still nonchalantly by food in the form of meat but never appear too full to sample an egg. A crow also considers eggs an epicure's delight.

...*Wild geese are still present in thousands and show unmistakable signs of thinning out. Geese have been shot in May with eggs in them in bygone days, but it is this scribe's opinion that the bulk of the laying geese began moving northward around April 20th. Black ducks are very numerous this spring and if even 50% of the pairs raise broods the fall crop should be a record. We also have a lot of crows, more in some sections than others, and we may be sure those black rascals will be continually on the lookout for nests. In sections of the West it has been established beyond the shadow of doubt that crows account for 80% of the wild ducks in the form of either eggs or ducklings. Around many Prairie sloughs there is not much protective cover for nesting ducks. In this Province the loss from crows is not considered to be in such a high bracket but they are suspected of destroying more ducks during the spring and summer than are shot by hunters in the fall. I do know from personal experience that crows destroy approximately 80% of the duck eggs laid in April.

...*Many hunters are wondering whether or not a Crow Contest will be put on this summer and it is only natural for them to suppose if a contest is arranged a bounty on the crow will follow as a matter of course. It is the consensus of opinion last fall that in districts where crows were intensively hunted and shot there was a proportionate increase in the number of black duck broods raised to maturity.

...*There appears to be a normal number of paired Hungarian partridge in evidence this spring and a number of farmers have reported hearing the Hun's sharp call from different sections of their farms without actually seeing the birds themselves. The challenging crow of the cock pheasant greets the dawn on many farms and prospects for upland game
