

STEWART FIRES 5 GOALS

All-Stars Dump Freetown 11-6 To Win Island Title

The West Prince All-Stars won the Provincial Intermediate "B" M.A.H.A. hockey championship in Alberton Saturday night by defeating the Freetown Royals by a convincing 11-6 score in the final game of a hardfought best-of-five playoff series.

The victory, witnessed by slightly over 700 fans, gave All-Stars Coach John Rochford his second Island title in two years. Nine players from the Alberton Regals, 1956 P.E.I. N.S. Champions, are the All-Stars lineup this year. The name of the team was changed to All-Stars when four players from the O'Leary Maroons were added to the squad. Both teams are sponsored by the Regals Hockey Club.

SCORES FIVE
All-Stars left winger Wendell Stewart racked up a total of five goals, all but one on passes from centre Lloyd Gaudet, who played an outstanding game. The West Prince men enjoyed a 3-2 edge on the ice in the opening round, and increased their lead 9-4 in a sizzling middle frame which saw West Prince goalie Perley Hardy make a successful save against a

penalty shot fired by McMurdo and awarded against the home team when one of their players threw himself on a loose puck inside the All-Stars goal crease.

It was the first penalty shot seen by local fans for seven or eight years and the save brought a tremendous cheer from the crowd.

Mills and McMurdo played strong games for the Royals, each chalking up a pair of markers.

The game was played on the best ice since the closely contested series got underway on March 12th. All previous encounters between the two teams were on wet slushy ice.

At the final bell Saturday night the Royals swarmed on the ice to shake hands with their opponents, taking their defeat in a very sportsmanlike manner.

The All-Stars leave for Amherst today where they will play the Amherst St. Pats in a two game total goal series for the P.E.I. N.B. title. The second game is planned for Alberton on Wednesday. Although in Nova Scotia, the St. Pats played in New Brunswick and won the Provincial title in a series with Dalhousie.

Detroit Tigers Could Be Team To Beat N. Y. Yankees

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Around the Detroit camp there is talk that this is the best Tiger team since the war. Around the rest of the American League there is a suspicion that the Tigers may be the only club with a real chance to upset New York Yankees.

Whether this optimism is real or synthetic, only time can tell. With a few minor changes, this is the same ball club that finished fifth, 17 games back, under Bucky Harris last September. Now the same players, plus some rookies and men like Jim Finigan and Eddie Robinson, are being hailed as a second place team without ever playing a game for Jack Tighe, their freshman manager.

It might be well for Tiger fans to temper their enthusiasm with the sobering thought that first base still are question marks and the catching is only fair. Although the Detroit club did play better ball than the Yankees in the last half of the season, they still finished in the second division. Still, they were the only club to take the season series from New York, 12-10.

"I'm not predicting a pennant,"

manager Tighe said. "Everybody else is doing that in the newspapers. But I know we're going to have a little fun."

SOLID PUNCH
Al Kaline and Harvey Kuenn provide the solid batting punch that gave the Tigers a team average of .279, best in the league by nine points.

Tighe loves to talk about his pitching staff, especially the 1-2-3 punch of Billy Hoft (20-14), Frank Lary (21-13) and Paul Foytack (15-13).

Tighe has been making a "grand experiment" this spring, shifting veteran Ray Boone (20) from third to first base. It all depends on the play of the third base candidates, Jim Finigan (.216 at Kansas City) and Reno Berrola (.208 at Charleston). The catching is just fair, with Frank House (.240), Red Wilson (.289) and possibly Charles Lau (.258 at Charleston).

Summing up, the Tigers have a solid punch, good first line pitching and a questionable infield defence. They shape up as a first division ball club but need plenty of breaks and top years by every body to be a real contender.

Habs Win 3-0 To Take 2nd; Howe Paces Detroit Victory

Montreal Canadiens clinched second place in their final game of the National Hockey League schedule Saturday night. Their 3-0 shutout of Chicago Black Hawks also assured goalie Jacques Plante of the Vezina Trophy.

At Toronto, right winger Gordie Howe all but clinched his fifth scoring title in seven seasons as he led Detroit Red Wings to a 5-3 victory over the Maple Leafs.

New York Rangers won 4-2 over the Bruins at Boston to prevent the Beantowners from tying the Canadiens in point production. Bruins, who played their final regular game Saturday, now face first place Detroit while New York meets the Canadiens in the Stanley Cup semi-finals.

HOWE SCORES FIVE
Howe scored two goals and set up another at Toronto to raise his point total for the season to 87, including 44 goals. That gave him a three-point lead over line mate Ted Lindsay and Jean Beliveau of Montreal Canadiens, tied for second in the league. Howe assisted at Montreal and Lindsay scored a goal for Detroit.

Bill Dineen and Metro Prystay rounded off the Wings scoring while Barry Cullen, Dick Duff and defenceman Tim Horton were the Leafs' top scorers.

The Toronto goals ended any chance Detroit goalie Glen Hall had of winning the Vezina Trophy, awarded to the netminder who has played the most goals in the league and the fewest goals scored against him. Plante was the team's second best scorer, with 155 goals and 155 assists in 33rd of the season and 409 of his NHL career.

FIRES ATTACK
Canadiens unleashed a fearful offensive at Montreal, pouring shots at Chicago goalie Al Rollins whose work was the most spectacular seen at the Forum this season.

Handling an average of almost a shot a minute—sometimes five or six in as many seconds—Rollins bowled only a few times. Claude Provost and Maurice (Rocket) Richard were the scorers, Richard getting his 33rd of the season and 409 of his NHL career.

Assisting on Provost's goal, Doug Harvey broke his own record for assists by an NHL defenceman. He finished the season with 44. His former record of 43 was made two seasons ago.

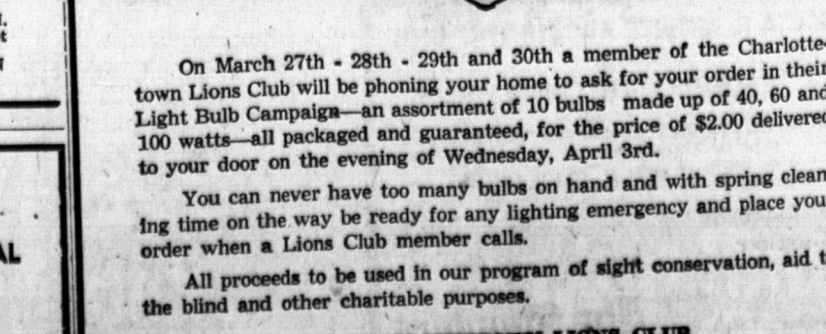

Gas and oil are two items of care care most people look after religiously. People still seem to run out of gas occasionally (I guess a lot of girls still haven't caught on), and sometimes pass 1,000 miles and the oil is still sticking around (and I do mean sticking).

Of the simple things, though, I think the battery gets overlooked more than anything else.

In hot weather, it's a good idea to have the generator output adjusted before starting on long trips. Overcharging is harmful to the battery. In winter, on the other hand, you should recharge the battery frequently because an undercharged battery may freeze and crack.

The water level, of course, should always be over the plates of the battery. Which reminds me of a little trick that might prove useful. If you know the battery needs water and you can't find any distilled water break some of the frost off your refrigerator freezing unit and thaw it out. It's perfect for the job.
