LB. Says Rights Law Must Stand

NEW YORK (AP)—President Johnson told the American Bar Association Wednesday he will enforce the civil rights law and citizens must observe it regardless of demonstrations in the streets and violence in the night.

In a city where racial disorder erupted recently in Harlem and Brooklyn, Johnson pledged that: "We will not permit any part of America to become a jungle where the weak are the prey of the strong and the many."

While speaking of maintaining law and order among American citizens, Johnson also stressed in his prepared address that "we work for peaceful process among nations and for the defense of freedom because it is right that we should."

But he asked U.S. allies to lend a strengthened hand and he upheld the administration's over-all policy in Viet Nam—a policy that has drawn the fire of Senator Barry Goldwater, Republican presidential nominee.

AIM CONSISTENT
In South Viet Nam, through three administrations, Johnson said, the United States has had one consistent aim—the observance of 1954 agreements, guiding and ensuring the country's independence.

"That independence has been the consistent target of aggression and terror," he said.

For 10 years, he said, the United States response to these attacks has followed a consistent pattern in which the Vietnamese bear basic responsibility for defending their own freedom and the U.S. is committed to using its power to the extent needed to repel aggression.

Without mentioning names, the president said there are those who would have us depart from these tested principles and those who would have us withdraw from the conflict. He said there are "a few" who enlarge the conflict with reckless action which might risk the lives of millions, engulf much of Asia and threaten the peace of the world.

"The course we have chosen will require wisdom and endurance," Johnson said. "But let me no one doubt we have the resources and the will to follow this course as long as it may take."

PCs Charge Hansard Tampering

OTTAWA (CP)—The Conservatives charged Wednesday that the official Hansard record of Commons proceedings was tampered with in relation to a resolution made by Finance Minister Gordon.

At the insistence of Opposition Leader J. Diefenbaker, Speaker Alan Macnaughton agreed to examine the matter, which centres on the single word "the" and was described by New Democratic MP Douglas Fisher as a "tempest in a teapot."

The Conservative charge, initiated by Michael Starr, MP for Ontario and former labor minister, sparked a 12-minute baffle.

Mr. Starr said that during Tuesday's debate on a federal-provincial tax-sharing measure Mr. Gordon was reported in the Hansard "thus" saying: "What is one hundred million?"

The "thus" are a mimeographed transcript of Commons debates made available by the Hansard office within an hour. Before the day's record is put in final printed form, members generally are permitted to correct inaccurate statements of fact and to make minor editorial changes as long as the context is not altered.

Mr. Starr said that in the printed Hansard published Wednesday morning, the command was altered to "What is the one hundred million?" The word "the" had been inserted. He said there had been tampering with Hansard, the official record, and this should not be indulged in by anyone.

Death By Dog Is Accidental

LAC BEAUFORT, Que. (CP)—A coroner's verdict of accidental death was reached here in the killing of a three-year-old child at this vacation spot outside Quebec by a Siberian husky dog.

The owner of the dog and father of the child, Leon Sanson, killed the husky. Leon Jr. was found dead with his throat and cheeks torn by the dog's teeth Sunday night after an older brother had left him alone in a yard near where his father keeps a 20-dog kennel.

The boy's parents were absent when the boy was attacked. "I have the impression the boy must have wakened the dog, and the dog then pounced on him," said Coroner J. E. Raymond. "The dog was attached by a 15-foot chain."

The boy's father had said, however, that the child and the dog had been friendly.
