The meeting of the Dairyman's board of trade (Cheese Board) were held in the city as usual. The first meeting convened on June 24 at which a lengthy discussion took place as to whether it was in the interest of the cheese industry to continue the board meetings or not. It was finally decided to hold an other meeting and in the meantime the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the different factories and find out their wishes in the matter as the responses were generally favorable. The board continued its regular meeting as usual and supplied cable messages for the guidance of the salesmen. The officers were elected at this second meeting: President, George Brown, New Glasgow. Vice Pres., Alex McDonald, Glenfinnan, Secy., Treas. and salesman, Robert Jenkins Mt. Albion, Auditor, P. F. Hughes Emerald.

Very few salesmen attended the meetings but more buyers than usual were present. I regret to report that no sales were made on the board during the summer. The salesmen seemed to be under the impression that the highest price

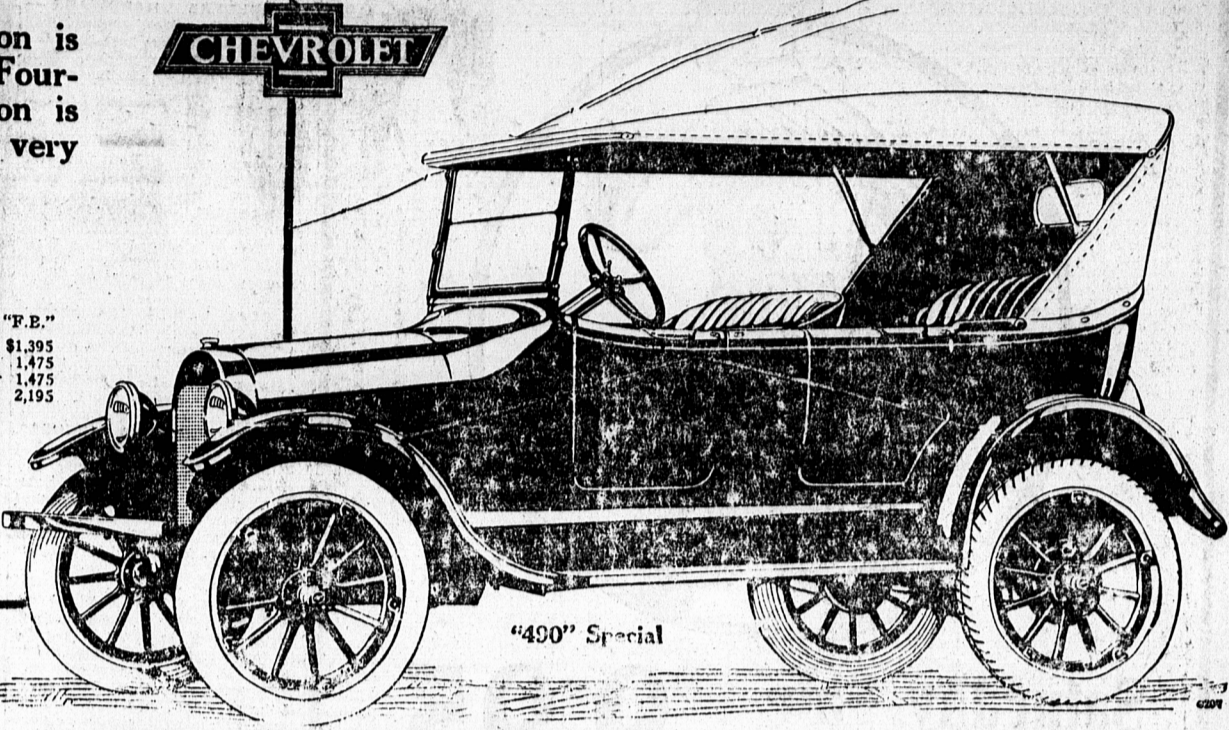

H. G. WELLS TELLS OF HIS EARLY DAYS BEHIND COUNTER

LONDON, June 14.—H. G. Wells, who has never forgotten his early days as a shop assistant, sent a lively letter, full of amusing reminiscence and advice, to the members of the National Amalgamated Union of Shop Assistants, Warehousemen, and Clerks, when they were assembled at their thirty-first annual dinner.
"As you know," wrote Mr. Wells, "I began life behind the counter (a draper's counter) when I was thirteen, and I suppose if I had had a normal ability to pack parcels and respect my shopwalker, I should have been a draper's assistant all my life. What got me out of business was nothing but incompetence. I couldn't handle the stuff skilfully and I couldn't keep bright and attentive for long spells."
"I can work pretty well in short spells, but when I must knock off for half an hour or so before I can go on, and the staying power of my colleagues filled me with astonishment and envy. To this day the steady good temper and patient alertness of the shop assistant compels my admiration."
"I don't know what sort of message to give your company, except my very respectful and friendly greetings. If I were talking to young assistants and trying to be fatherly and helpful, I should say: Read all you can and keep up-to-date; learn everything you can of the story of the stuff you handle before you go into the shop, and get back towards the wholesale if you can."
"The greater danger that threatens a shop assistant is routine. Don't, if you find a comfortable position fall into routine. No branch of human activities is undergoing such profound and revolutionary changes as the distributing branch.
"Everything is changing, methods of production, transport, handling, and display. The tempo and quality of the customer are changing too. This means bother for you; it means change and accommodation—but it means opportunity. May you see it in good time and grip it with both hands."
