"SONG OF SURRENDER" IS POWERFUL DRAMA — A sensitively developed drama of love's fight for fulfillment is Paramount's "Song of Surrender," which opened at the Capitol Theatre today. Powerfully acted and splendidly produced, this attraction provides some of the most wonderful music ever heard in a theatre.

The film's rich musical background has been woven into the fabric of the story in such a way that it becomes an essential part of the plot's development.
