NOTWITHSTANDING the absence of the Princess Louise, Ottawa is looking forward to a gay time this winter. It is stated that at the opening of Parliament there will be a Drawing Room and Levee, to be followed during the season by theatricals, at least two balls, and occasional dinner parties.

WERE THEY LOST?—A correspondent of the St. John Telegraph at Cape Jourimaine states that "Two young men named Colson and Willis Allen left P. E. Island, on Friday last, in an ice-boat to cross to Cape Jourimaine and have not since been heard from." We trust they may, however, yet be circumstanced as are alarming.

ANOTHER BANK IN TROUBLE.—From the general statements of the Exchange Bank of Yarmouth, submitted at the annual meeting, it appears that owing to the heavy losses sustained the paid up capital has been impaired by 20 per cent. The directors' report was adopted, recommending that steps be taken to obtain the necessary legislation for reducing the paid-up capital, in all 30 per cent., thus providing a reserve fund of about \$340,000 and placing the Bank in a position to resume payment of dividends at an early day. The former directors were re-elected.—Moncton Times.

STEAMERS MISSING.—The steamer "City of London," which sailed from London for New York Nov. 13th, has not been heard from, and is believed to be sunk. She had on board passengers. Her cargo was valued at \$200,000. She was 18 1/2 tons, built of iron, and valued at \$100,000. The steamer "Henry Edye," sailed from Antwerp Nov. 21st for Boston, and has not been heard from. Her agents there give her up as lost. She had no passengers. Her cargo was iron and beet sugar, and was valued at \$300,000. She was valued at \$150,000 and was 1659 tons, and had a crew of thirty five men.

BUSINESS FAILURE.—Messrs. Clark, Robbée & Clark, dry goods merchants and general traders, Suramerside, P. E. I., have suspended, with liabilities of \$21,000. The assets are estimated at \$14,000. The firm, who have been in business seven or eight years, and have always enjoyed a good reputation for honesty and honesty, are offering a compromise of thirty-five cents cash, which the creditors do not generally seem willing to accept. They attribute their difficulty to losses by bad debts and losses through failures in lobster canning. The creditors, chiefly in this city, have sent a representative to investigate the affairs of the estate.—Montreal Journal of Commerce.

ON the 18th instant Henry G. Vennor wrote to the Montreal papers: "There are indications of the approach of a storm of considerable force, which I think is likely to sweep over a large portion of the continent of Europe, between the 20th and 22nd days of the month (Friday, Saturday or Sunday). This will probably be marked by general gales, and by snow or rain storms, according to locality. New York and neighboring seaboard are likely to suffer also. In other seaboard cities of the Middle States the temperature will not likely be low. Snow storms are likely to occur in Great Britain, accompanied by severe gales. There may be cold weather, with snow, in the extreme South about the 24th or 25th.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on

WEDNESDAY,

the 25th Day of January, A. D. 1882

At the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heart's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

At 43 Victoria Cap 15: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councilors, the persons or candidates for the office of Mayor or Councilor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and additions of such persons "together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councilor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councilor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose. Qualification of Electors. See Act 43 Victoria, cap. 15, sec. 20 and 24.
