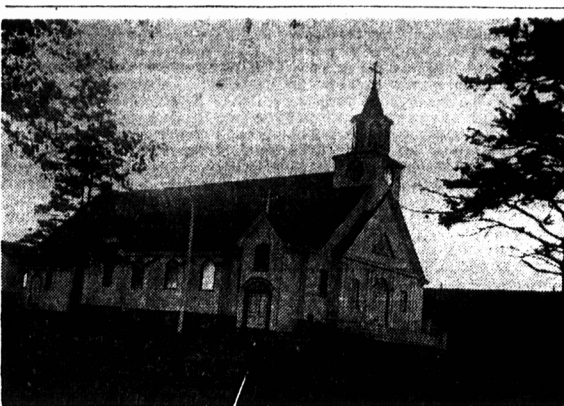

Interesting History Recalled By Dedication Ceremony On Sunday Of New Church Building At Wellington

The blessing and dedication of the new Church of the Immaculate Conception at Wellington on Sunday next recalls the interesting history of this parish, of which a sketch is given below. The former church was destroyed by fire on January 21, 1951, and the following spring work was started on the new building, which was opened for service on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8, 1952. The first part of Sunday morning's service will consist of the blessing of the cornerstone, followed by the dedication ceremony. Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, will officiate and will be present at the throne in the sanctuary of Mass. Rev. J. F. Buotte, pastor at Mont Carmel, will be the preacher.

Wellington was in the first years of its existence an Irish settlement. About the year 1843 a number of emigrants from the South of Ireland took up land in the vicinity of the present location of the village, and commenced farming operations. Owing to various causes these people ultimately dispersed to other districts and Highland farmers from Grand River moved to the vacant farms, so that Wellington became a Scotch parish. The settlers for over thirty years attended Mass at the church of St. Patrick, Grand River West, but in May, 1872 they purchased land from Mr. Donald McDonald and took measures towards the building of a church for themselves. This church was begun in 1874 and was built under the direction of Rev. Father Donald B. MacDonald, later a member of the So-

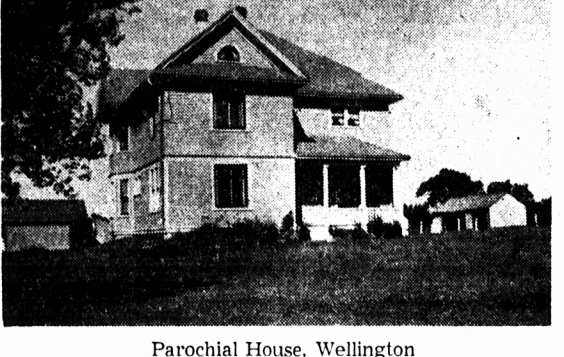


Wellington Church. Destroyed by fire on Sunday Jan. 21, 1951.

West Prince Teachers Hold Convention At O'Leary School

The West Prince teachers met in the O'Leary school yesterday for the opening day of the local convention. Registration was carried out and the meeting was called to order by the president, Mr. Earl Jelly. Minutes of last year's convention were read by Mrs. Mary MacIsaac, secretary. Discussion followed the reading of the minutes. The nominations committee brought in their findings as follows: Pres., Mrs. Mary MacIsaac and Miss Norma Gallant; resolutions, Mrs. Isobel Campbell, Mrs. Harold Doyle and Mrs. Blanche Warren; nominators, Mr. Alvin Hardy, Mrs. John Profit and Mrs. Pearl Duncan.

The president, Mr. Earl Jelly in his report suggested that teachers use the beginning of the year as a time for planning, consider not the present day as a day's work and use co-operation in district dealing. Miss Estelle Bonness, general secretary of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation was then introduced by the chairman. Activities for the past year were outlined in a report read by Miss Bonness. Its adoption was moved and seconded by the teachers present.

An interesting discussion took place concerning the Teachers Aid of which Miss Bonness is director. All queries were ably dealt with by the speaker. Mr. Jelly in a few remarks outlined a report of the federation convention in Montreal. The local supervisor, Mr. Merritt Callaghan was then introduced. He stressed the importance of a thorough perusal of the course of studies by the teachers. Of all studies, the speaker said, reading is the foundation. He urged all districts to provide nature texts for the use of the pupil. A helpful talk on the use of text books and aids available was given. Miss Ruth Ross, health instructor of the teachers training class, was then introduced by the chairman. Her subject "Health in The Schools" was most interesting and profitable. Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, general superintendent of schools, was the first speaker at the afternoon session. He also stressed the need of studying well the course of studies. Some very helpful advice to teachers was given out by the speaker.

The chairman called on Mr. Louis McKenzie, principal of O'Leary High School, who gave a demonstration of language study. In the absence of Mr. Ralph McLean, Mr. Malcolm McKenzie outlined some very helpful suggestions in the teaching of elementary science. The teachers will re convene again today.

Magistrate's Court At Alberton
