Even in these days, when local self government has destroyed the greater part of a native's respect for a sahib, I have been accustomed to a certain amount of civility from my inferiors, and on approaching the crowd naturally expected that there would be some recognition of my presence. As a matter of fact there was, but it was by no means what I had looked for.

The ragged crew actually laughed at me—such laughter I hope I may never hear again. They cackled, yelled, whistled and howled as I walked into their midst, some of them literally throwing themselves down on the ground in convulsions of unholy mirth. In a moment I had let go Pornc's head, and, irritated beyond expression at the morning's adventure, commenced cuffing those nearest to me with all the force I could. The wretches dropped under my blows like ninepins, and the laughter gave place to wails for mercy, while those yet untouched clasped me round the knees, imploring me in all sorts of uncouth tongues to spare them.

In the tumult and just when I was feeling very much ashamed of myself for having thus easily given way to my temper a thin, high voice murmured in English from behind my shoulder "Sahib! Sahib! Do you not know me? Sahib, it is Gunga Dass, the telegraph master."

I spun round quickly and faced the speaker.

Gunga Dass (I have, of course, no hesitation in mentioning the man's real name) I had known four years before as a Deccane Brahman lent by the Punjab government to one of the Khalsa states. He was in charge of a branch telegraph office there, and when I had last met him was a jovial, full stomached, portly government servant, with a marvelous capacity for making bad puns in English, a peculiarity which made me remember him long after I had forgotten his services to me in his official capacity. It is seldom that a Hindoo makes English puns.

Now, however, the man was changed beyond all recognition. Caste mark, stomach, slate colored continuations and unctuous speech were all gone. I looked at a withered skeleton, turbanless and almost naked, with long, matted hair and deep set, codfish eyes. But for a crescent shaped scar on the left cheek, the result of an accident for which I was responsible, I should never have known him. But it was indubitably Gunga Dass and—for this I was thankful—an English speaking native, who might at least tell me the meaning of all that I had gone through that day.

The crowd retreated to some distance as I turned toward the miserable figure and ordered him to show me some method of escaping from the crater. He held a freshly plucked crow in his hand and in reply to my question climbed slowly on a platform of sand which ran in front of the holes and commenced lighting a fire there in silence. Dried bents, sand poppies and driftwood burn quickly, and I derived much consolation from the fact that he lit them with an ordinary sulphur match. When they were in a bright glow and the crowd was neatly spitted in front thereof, Gunga Dass began without a word of preamble:

"There are only two kinds of men, sar, the alive and the dead. When you are dead, you are dead, but when you are alive, you live." Here the crowd demanded his attention for an instant as it twirled before the fire in danger of being burned to a cinder. "If you die at home, and do not die when you come to the ghat to be burned, you come here."

The nature of the reeking village was made plain now, and all that I had known or read of the grotesque and the horrible paled before the fact just communicated by the ex-Brahman. Sixteen years ago, when I first landed in Bombay, I had been told by a wandering Armenian of the existence, somewhere in India, of a place to which such Hindoos as had the misfortune to recover from trance or catalepsy were conveyed and kept, and I recollect laughing heartily at what I was then pleased to consider a traveler's tale. Sitting at the bottom of the sand trap, the memory of Watson's hotel, with its swinging punkas, white robed attendants and the sallow faced Armenian, rose up in my mind as vividly as a photograph, and I burst into a loud fit of laughter. The contrast was too absurd!

Gunga Dass, as he bent over the unclean bird, watched me curiously. Hindoos seldom laugh, and his surroundings were not such as to move Gunga Dass to any undue excess of hilarity. He removed the crow solemnly from the wooden spit and as solemnly devoured it. Then he continued his story, which I give in his own words:

ed the cheapest. They borrowed \$30,000 from the Credit Foncier at 4 1/2 per cent. when the previous Government paid 6 and 7 per cent. We created a sinking fund in order that at future generations should pay for what we provide for them. We issued our last debentures at 2 1/2 p. c., and floated them at par. It is an opportune time to do this and go ahead with the public works. By the withdrawal from capital of \$200,000 there was lost to this province for all time \$10,000 in interest. The Liberals had saved at \$5000 a year by abolishing the Legislative Council. We expect to close the Land Office shortly, and create a minister of agriculture. Wharves and ferry boats had to be kept in repair. There is always been too much money spent here. We expect to save \$6000 this year on the Hillsborough ferry without inconveniencing the public. The expenditures on railways have been \$25,000 or \$26,000—enough to run the country. We expect to spend some \$4,000 this year on roads, about \$700 less than last year. We have 28 road machines, and the roads are now fairly good. We will spend \$14,000 on the roads and will spend it properly too. We propose to spend \$20,000 in bridges, and we intend to put down into steel structures. We should have permanent public works as far as possible.

Mr. Farquharson then took up the question of revenue showing the following:

By adding up these figures hon. members will find that the revenue and expenditure will be made to meet, and that there will be a small surplus. He would not, however, guarantee this surplus. Much depends on the weather and other circumstances. It was better to pay interest and have permanent public works. They proposed to carry on the affairs of the province economically, to pay all their honest debts. They did not wish to adopt a starva ion policy. They want institutions that the people can be justly proud of. It would be something new to have both ends meet at the end of the year. In conclusion the premier thanked the House for the attention shown him, expressing the hope that the debate would not be unduly prolonged and that the House would adjourn by Friday.

Hon. Mr. Gordon's Reply.

Hon. Mr. Gordon, who followed, said he had listened to the Leader with much attention. He had treated the Opposition very well, and was in fairly good temper. The leader has become moderate and even complimentary. But his speech seemed to indicate that language was given to man to conceal his thoughts. Whilst listening to the remarks of the Leader he could not help thinking of the words of the late lamented Hon. Joseph Howe. Howe said: "The natural tendency of all Provincial Governments favor the growth of a pernicious system of extravagance." The predecessor of the Leader of the Government said his Administration did not owe one dollar, and denounced the Conservatives, remarking that the minister strains of his province would sing the praises of his Government. But he (Mr. Gordon) had not heard these strains. On the other hand the people complained that everything had been taxed. The dead and the living have been levied upon, yet the debt of the province keeps on growing and he had no hope that it would ever be reduced. Every young man who can do so is leaving the Province. The young men will not stay on the farm.

Every day this winter our young men left the country. They are to be found from Manila to Patagonia and in the Yukon. The old are left to bear the burden of the debt. Mr. Coles never allowed the debt to accumulate. This building cost \$12,000; yet our forefathers did not go into debt. The policy of the Conservative party is not to go into debt. He saw no immediate chance of their return because the party in power can use the revenues of the country to keep themselves where they are. Mr. Gordon contended that it was the administration of public affairs and not the passing of the laws that had the most effect on the people.

The Leader said the province would get \$3,500 for a wharf at Mount Stewart, and this money is going to be used as ordinary money. Yet his predecessors were denounced for using such money as ordinary revenue. The Leader also says we are going to receive \$14,000 from a new tax, the nature of which he has not explained but which may be readily guessed at. Yet there is nothing for exhibitions. There is \$500 in elections. Did this mean that the Leader of the Government was to be the next Lieutenant Governor of the province and that the Attorney General was to be made Judge? Both merit these positions, and he would be delighted to see them appointed. The late Conservative administration erected many public works costing considerable money; but what is to be shown in this line for the past eight years? He regretted that there were so many prisoners in Queen's County jail, and that its cost was so great. The jail in King's County cost only \$300. There must be a lookup in each county. By the

Public Accounts we find that the debt of the province is \$536,858.37. This sum was sufficiently large to alarm the most careful. It will require \$20,000 a year for interest. If spent for agriculture, this sum would be of great benefit to our farmers. As the hour was late M. Gordon said he would not proceed any further at present. House adjourned.
