Defence Extension Plans For P. E. I. Indicated

Ship Repair Facilities For Ch'town Anticipated

OTTAWA, Feb. 6 — (Special) — Impact of Canada's expanded defence program on Prince Edward Island will be felt particularly by air and naval units, it was learned here today. As the three-year-plan for defence announced by Defence Minister Claxton in the Commons last night gathers momentum, existing defence establishments on the Island will be enlarged and possibly new ones added.

Doubling of the numerical strength of the Royal Canadian Navy and adding to coastal defences will undoubtedly react on Charlottetown. While detailed plans have not as yet been made public, it is expected that facilities for the refitting and repair of ships of war will be provided at the harbor of the provincial capital. Efforts will be made to increase the strength of the H.M.C.S. "Queen Charlotte" as part of the defence plans.

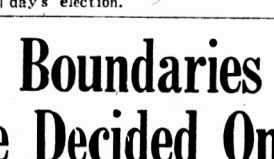
