AGITATION
We live in a world of agitation, we are an excitable people. It is from the "frying pan into the fire" most of the time. Take China, for instance, at war for nine years! There is a whole generation growing up who know no other condition, and is apt to become an element in their common way of thinking.

Of course life means motion; stagnation means a death. The physical keeps pure by changing all the time, while the stagnant pool becomes corrupt. The old Rabbi Ben Ezra says: "Then welcome each rebuff That turns earth's smoothness rough. Each sting that bids nor sit nor stand but go!"

But too much agitation does harm. There are many labour troubles now and higher wages mean higher cost of living. What we call prosperity may be but a fiction. The human condition all round after all our disputes may leave us not better but worse.

Old mother nature has her own way of managing her house. People are not all born with exactly the same tastes. It would not do if all people wished to go round dressed in "Sunday clothes." There are tasks to be done when we are as honourable as evening dress; and to make a man dissatisfied who already enjoys his work, and breed in him a sort of inferiority complex, is wrong. Here is where agitators play their part.

We hear a great deal about "slum clearing" in these days. The term is akin to slump. It applies to city or town areas which have sunk or slumped. John Bunyan from whom we may learn much has a character, Mr. Fear- ing, one of his masterpieces of portrayal. Mr. Fear- ing as his name would indicate was a man of a timid spirit. The story is told how hard it was to get him over the "Slough of Despond", but at last he got over. Then the proud theologian Bunyan says "there was a slough of despond in the man's mind." So it is that there are slumps in certain people's minds, and we need to change the minds of the people or they would make slums new quarters if given them.

What we need today is to get the minds and hearts of the people cleaned and then the physical clean-up will follow. But if there are "slums in the mind," and left there, a clean house and more money will not suffice.

There are many tasks to be done which are humble but are a credit to the doer. In a great house there are vessels of honour and some for common use. So in the large house of mother nature. There is hard work to be done if the house is to be kept in good condition. Iron must be dug from the hills, coal from the bowels of the earth, trees felled and carried across oceans in man-made ships, land tilled, bread baked, clothes made, foundries kept running, garbage collected, and a thousand other services rendered to the economy of things.

As this is necessary, and mother nature sees to it that there are those who like to do this. Jesus, the son of Sirach said of all such toilers: "They maintain the state of the world." Did not Jesus, the Son of God learn to be a carpenter? He wrought his trade and made it his honour. To get people to be dissatisfied with their work is wrong and wicked. The real test is, "Is the work that I am engaged in doing any good to any one, is it necessary, is it useful?"

Paul bade the slave to be a good workman. The time came when the work was looked upon as a great wrong to men for man is an end in himself and not a means. The workman is worthy of his hire and he should get it. The world is a sort of workshop where all should be busy and be something. Unfortunately we are compelled to think too much in terms of money, and living has become far too costly. Our living may be high in cost and very ordinary in matters of real worth.

Faculty Changes
"Here were several changes in the Faculty in the past year. Seven vacancies occurred when two instructors left to be married, two to reenter university, two to teach elsewhere, and one to enter the Navy. Five full-time instructors and one half-time instructor were appointed. The five, Messrs. Smith, Aikens, Coyle, Lothian and Wilson had had excellent training and valuable teaching experience and they have done extremely good work at Prince of Wales. The sixth, Dr. Spacek, served half-time with the Department of Health and Welfare and he has made a most effective contribution to the medical services of that Department. Despite the usual changes in personnel each session, the size of the Faculty has remained constant over the last five years.

"I am sure that this Convocation will join my colleagues and me in congratulating Dr. Norman Smith of the mathematics department on his being awarded the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from McGill University. A fine teacher and faithful colleague, as well as an excellent mathematician, he has already made a name for himself among Canadian mathematicians. In fact, as far as we are concerned, he is too well known, for much to our regret, he will be resigning later this year to accept another teaching post in Central Canada. He leaves with our assurance that in one year he has made a splendid contribution to our work at Prince of Wales.

Dr. MacKinnon Reviews Aims And Achievements At PWC

"A combination of hard work, loyalty, good will, and imagination have brought Prince of Wales a long way since 1834, and on each Convocation we hope and pray that such a combination will carry the College into an even greater future," said Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College, in his address at yesterday's largely attended convocation exercises.

"Once more," said Dr. MacKinnon, "it is my privilege to welcome to Convocation the parents and friends of the College who join in the joy of our students on the completion of a successful year. It is 118 years since this institution was established as the Central Academy, and ninety-two years since it was renamed Prince of Wales. Therefore it is with a deep sense of the history and traditions of education in this Province that we realize that another graduating class joins the ranks of the many thousands who have gone forth from these halls continuously since 1834. Convocation day is the students' day and we congratulate them on what they have done and wish them well as they go on to further achievement.

"The past year has been a very successful and happy one, and our students have measured up to the standards of study and conduct of their predecessors. We thank them as individuals, and as an organization led by a very effective Students' Council, for their splendid co-operation.

"I should like also to express appreciation of the good will and support which we have received from the Executive Council of this Province, which is the governing body of the College, and from the Premier and Minister of Education, the Honourable J. Walter Jones. In return we can assure them of our efforts to be worthy of their continued interest in the welfare of Prince of Wales.

"Once more I am glad to congratulate the College Faculty on their work during the year. Most of them are conscientious teachers who are loyal to the College and devoted to the students and I should like to thank these officials for their work and personally for their support and co-operation.

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"In the field of cultural activity we were again privileged to hear an excellent Robertson Memorial Lecture. This year the speaker was Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia, who delivered the third of what have been worthy B.A., M.Ed., and Miss Eleanor McQuaid.
