

Provincial Legislature. House of Assembly.

APRIL 6. Mr. Bentley asked the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of the House a return of all correspondence between the present Government and the commissioners appointed to value the A. E. C. Holland's estate on Lot 28, purchased by the late Government in 1891; also a statement of the charges made by said commissioners for valuing said estate, and how much was paid, if any, for their services.

Mr. Warburton asked the Leader of the Government to authorize the Rolls Court of this Island of certain moneys paid into that court by the Water Commissioners of Charlotteown. The bill was received and read a first time.

Mr. A. McLeod asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it were the intention of the Government to widen the road leading from Valleyfield to McRae's Mills; also, if it is the intention of the Government to open a small grant to open a piece of new road which runs angle ways through McPhee's farm leading from McRae's Mills to Brown's Creek.

Hon. Mr. McLean replied: As to the first question, the matter is under the consideration of the Government and will probably be settled; as to the second, the Government will endeavor to open the road as soon as possible.

Mr. Speaker communicated a message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, together with the estimates of expenditures during the current year:

Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to complete the road leading from the Cardigan Road to Lorne Valley through the land of John Milligan, this season, the right of way being secured to the Government. Also, if it is the intention of the Government to complete the opening of the road leading from Prospect Hill to Narrows Creek the ensuing summer.

Hon. Mr. McLean replied that both these roads were under the consideration of the Government.

Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to place the Launching Wharf in such condition as will be suitable for shipping purposes the coming autumn; also if it is the intention of the Government to open a new road from Launching Road to Cardigan River the present year leading on the right of way secured from Mr. Michael Sweeney during the past year.

Hon. Mr. McLean replied that it was doubtful whether the Dominion Government ought not to repair the wharf; the matter of the road would receive attention.

Mr. Rogers asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table a detailed statement showing the several items of expenditure contained in the sum of \$1,290.66, as shown in the Public Works Report of 1891, and charged to roads in Queen's, Prince and King's Counties, and in inquiries on new roads not shown by the report of the Commissioner of Public Works, to have been spent by the supervisors, the items by public competition or private contract, the nature of the work done, the different localities in which the work has been done, the names of the several persons to whom the several contracts were given, and the amount received by each person respectively, and the authority by which each contract was let, and the date of each payment made.

Hon. Mr. McLean replied that the matter would receive attention.

Mr. N. McLeod asked the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer to lay on the table a statement showing all payments made on account of the public service from 31st December, 1891, up to this date, such statement to show what part of this amount was due up to and including the 31st December, 1891; also what amounts are due or owing by the several departments of the public service up to the 6th April, 1892.

Hon. Mr. McMillan said that the return would be submitted as soon as possible.

FORENOON SESSION. House met at half-past eleven. Mr. Bentley asked the Commissioner of Crown Lands to lay on the table a detailed statement showing the person or persons to whom the sum of \$508.19 refunded was paid, as shown by appendix B. Public Lands Report, and the reasons for which the several refunds have been made.

Hon. Mr. McMillan said the information asked for would be laid on the table.

Mr. Bentley asked the Leader of the Government to lay on the table all papers and correspondence between this Government and the Dominion Government relative to our claims against that Government for non-fulfillment of the terms of union and other claims that the Province may have against the Government.

Mr. Peters said he would like to know how far back the hon. gentleman would like him to go. The question should be definite.

Mr. Bentley said he wanted the correspondence between the present Government and the Dominion Government.

Mr. Peters said that such part of the correspondence as he thought could be laid before the House without injuring the Government's work would be produced.

Mr. Bentley thought the House had a right to all the correspondence.

Mr. Bell submitted an Act to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act of 1886, which was read a first time and made the

order of the day for a second reading tomorrow.

Mr. Bentley asked the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of the House a return of all correspondence between the present Government and the commissioners appointed to value the A. E. C. Holland's estate on Lot 28, purchased by the late Government in 1891; also a statement of the charges made by said commissioners for valuing said estate, and how much was paid, if any, for their services.

Mr. Gordon asked the Leader of the Government why the final report of the commissioners appointed to investigate the affairs of the Public Lands Office, and which Report was submitted to the Government in the autumn of 1890, was not laid on the table during the last session of the Legislature; also the reason why the report was not published as an appendix to the Journals of the Assembly for the last year; the sheets for the same having been printed, folded and gathered by order of the late government, so that its publication in the Journals would entail little or no cost.

Hon. Mr. Peters said the final report of the commissioners was put in the hands of the members and the public before the House met. He was not aware until he saw the notice on the order book that the late government had the sheets gathered and stitched together as stated. He thought the circulation of this report throughout the country was a sufficient record of the proceedings.

Mr. Sullivan asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it was the intention of the Government to open the road from Goose River Road, Lot 42, to the shore road through the farms of Angus D. McKinnon and Michael MacDonnell during the present summer; also if it was the intention of the Government to open the road from St. Peter's Road to Savage Harbor, through the farms of Michael Cunningham and Martin McGilversay, the right of way having been secured some time ago, also if it was the intention of the Government to complete the road leading from Donnelly's Road, Lot 38, to Byrne's Road.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the several roads asked about had been under the consideration of the Government as soon as they were submitted to him. He would submit a bill to incorporate the Temperance Hall Co. at Murray Harbor South, which was read a first time and made the order of the day for a second reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Peters presented a bill to allow Louis M. Hollick to transfer certain lands in Prince County, which was referred to the Private Bills Committee.

On motion the House went into committee of the whole to further consider the Act respecting the Legislature, Mr. Angus McLeod in the chair.

The Leader of the Opposition moved that in section 52, (qualification of voters), after subsection 9, be added, "or any man in any electoral district, who is a district school-teacher or teacher or professor in any school or college in this province otherwise qualified under this act, or every person who derives an income from some trade, occupation, calling, office or profession, of not less than \$250 annually, board and lodging to be included as part of said income, and who is a son of a land holder holding land as owner thereof with \$300 provided such son is a resident with the father at the time of the election, or every person who is residing at the time of the election in the electoral district in which he tenders his vote, and has resided there continuously for 12 months immediately prior to the time of such election, and who during the 12 months next prior to the time of such election derived or earned wages or income from some trade, occupation, calling, office or profession, of not less than \$200."

That the following, that is to say: "Is a son of a land holder, who has any one of the qualifications contained in subsections 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 69, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 81, 82, 83, 84, 85, 86, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91, 92, 93, 94, 95, 96, 97, 98, 99, 100," be added to section 52 after subsection 11."

Owing to the importance of the amendments proposed, the further consideration of section 52 was laid over for today.

A discussion followed on the clause in the bill referring to mortgage votes, taken part in by the Leader of the Government, the leader of the Opposition, Mr. Rogers and Mr. McKay.

House took recess.

Rifle Association Meeting.

The thirty-first annual meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association of Prince Edward Island was held last evening in the City Court Room. It was one of the most successful and enthusiastic meetings ever held in connection with the Association. The attendance was large and the very best of feeling prevailed. Minutes of previous meeting and report of council with financial statement was presented by the Secretary-Treasurer and unanimously approved. The total expenditure for the year was eleven hundred and forty-one dollars. Five hundred and fifty-seven dollars were given in prizes at annual prize meetings, one hundred and twenty-five dollars to rifle team attending the D. R. A. prize meeting at Ottawa, as entrance fee to matches.

Le. C. J. James Douglas Irving, B. M., was again unanimously chosen president, and Capt. Geo. B. Davison secretary and treasurer.

The following officers were appointed vice-presidents: Lt.-Col. Francis Doherty for Queen's County; Lt.-Col. Moore for King's County; Major McLeod for Prince County.

Members of council for Queen's County are: Capt. Stewart, Capt. Weeks, Capt. Crockett, and Staff-Sergeant Allen. For Prince County: Lieut. E. D. Stiers and Sergt. B. C. Prowse. For King's County: Lieut. E. Stewart and Surgeon Gillis.

Range committee: Capt. Weeks, Lt.-Col. Moore, and Capt. Stewart.

The Hon. L. H. Davies and John McLean, Esq. M. P., were elected representatives from this Association to the D. R. A., Ottawa.

On motion it was resolved that the thanks of this association be tendered to our patrons and friends, especially to the Lt. Governor, the Provincial Government, the Brigade Major, the Charlottetown Banks, the daily papers, the merchants of Charlottetown, and all contributing members. Moved by Lt.-Col. Doherty, seconded by Lt.-Col. Moore and carried unanimously, that His Lordship, Judge Hodgson, Master of the Idolls, be elected Vice-Patron of this association in place of the late Hon. Judge Young, L. L. D.

After considerable discussion it was decided to send a team to St. John in June next to compete for the inter Maritime trophy to be shot for on the St. John Range. A sum sufficient was granted to purchase return tickets for team.

Association adjourned for a meeting of Council.

Serious Fire at Cardigan.

[SPECIAL BY TELEPHONE.]

Half an hour after midnight the people of Cardigan Bridge were roused by a fire which had broken out in a barn owned by Mr. Ewen McGregor. The fire spread very rapidly and soon caught hold of a warehouse adjoining, and both buildings burned furiously. In the barn were two horses and a cow. Brave attempts were made to save these animals, but while they were working to this end the fire crossed the street and laid hold of a house owned by Allan Campbell. Every body went to the rescue of Campbell's furniture, and the poor animals in the meantime perished.

The flames having reduced Campbell's house to ashes again crossed the street and set fire to Mr. Ewen McGregor's house, and this completed the destruction. It began on his premises. The ruin, however, did not end here. A house owned by Mr. H. Davison, of this city, and occupied by Mr. Peter McPherson, next took fire and it, also, was burned to the ground. The men of the village worked hard to subdue the flames, but the fire fiend was too much for them, and spite of all their efforts they were unable to prevent the destruction which was caused. It is thought that the property owned by McGregor & Campbell was insured. It is not known what caused the fire.

The Northwest.

The Hon. David Laird has, evidently, made a careful study of the Northwest. In the course of his lecture of last evening he explained very clearly the causes why the valleys of the Red River and Saskatchewan, possesses the most fertile soil in the world, and showed how it is that the vaporous clouds pass over the arid plains of the United States, and just at the right time, to the month of June, precipitate their wealth of rain upon the fruitful fields of the Canadian prairie farmer. Mr. Laird also described the chinook winds and their causes and influence upon the climate of the west, in the vicinity of Calgary. His account of the operation of frost in the Northwest and the breaking of the ice in the rivers was most interesting. The chairman (Mr. Percy Pope) conveyed to the lecturer the thanks of his appreciative audience.
