PERHAPS NO more fun has been added to the sport, but skiers will agree that a great deal of work has been taken out of the long road back by the ski tow built on the 1,000-foot slope at Emviale, in the

heart of Lot 65. Hopeful the new tow will lead to an opening up of the province to many future winter outdoor sports, possibly entire future tourists who are notives on the ski and eventually have an ef-

fect on provincial economy by increasing Island business in otherwise off months. The parks division of the natural resources department has taken the lead.

Emviale Slopes Prove Popular With Skiers

An almost literal "break-through" in providing outdoor winter recreation in the province has been accomplished in the recent establishment near Emviale of a highly successful ski tow.

In back country on the outer rim of the Stratgartown hills there are excellent slopes gives skiers every chance to acquire skill in the sport, the provincial department of natural resources under Hon. Leo Rowley has provided good facilities for skiing enthusiasts.

A previous experiment at Stratgartown Park was not so successful due to obstructions in the form of buildings. The new ski slope offers no such difficulties. Steeply inclined at the takeoff point, the gradient gradually eases and ends in a leveling out field clear of all obstructions. While the run is not as lengthy one as ski runs are judged elsewhere, it still gives the enthusiast a thrill to race down and along a 1,000-foot run.

The weekend after opening there were approximately 100 people out to test the run or to watch the excitement and over 100 automobiles were gathered. **600 FEET UP**

The ski tow itself hauls the skiers 600 feet up the slope as they hang onto the rope. Power, capable of hauling eight to 10 people at a time, is supplied from a tractor with a cable from the rear wheel.

Keenly interested in the project - which could be the forerunner of many winter sports of the future - is the man primarily

responsible for its erection and operation. He is Wendell Profit, director of provincial parks, in Mr. Rosasier's department.

UNDER LIGHTS
Mr. Profit said the slide was primarily designed for weekend use, but for the balance of the season it could be operated afternoons or evenings under lights, if weather conditions are right, on request of a group of skiers.

The slope, designed for 50 to 100 skiers, has an easier slope on one side for the use of children, tobogganists, while mildly frowned on are not exactly forbidden. Trouble too frequently arises, officials maintain, when those on top brags, which may have too many people, place a heavy strain on the towing capacity. They also constitute a hazard to those going downhill on skis.

CO-OPERATION
It is hoped at a later date to have a parking lot to handle the many cars going out, but in the meantime Mr. Profit paid tribute to the excellent co-operation and work of the RCMP in controlling traffic. He also was very appreciative of the cooperation for the farmer landowners for the permission given for the ski run.

Incidentally he said, there is a canteen on the slope for coffee, sandwiches, soft drinks and candy and there is also a trained first aid man on duty. No charge is made for use of the facilities provided.

Letters Sent Spud Growers And Dealers
Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae said yesterday, good results have been produced from a lawyer's letter sent to some 34 potato growers and dealers who have been coming with regulations of the P.E.I. Marketing Board.

The growers and dealers had failed to comply with regulations which require potato exporters to have licenses and collect, report on and submit to the board a levy of one cent per 100 pounds on potatoes shipped from the province.

MacRae said that all but "eight or nine" dealers and growers have indicated they will comply with the regulations. "The other cases," he said, "require a few days for study of the regulations but it is expected by Friday they will come in line with board regulations."

The growers and dealers were told they would face court action if they did not comply with the license and levy regulations.
