

**Students in Revolt.**

A despatch from Moscow says:—"Between three and four hundred medical students assembled yesterday in the courtyard of the University seeking an explanation with the rector concerning the misunderstanding with two of the professors. The rector proceeded to the residence of the Governor General. The Chief of Police went to the University and ordered the students to disperse. They refused, and a serious conflict with the police and gendarmes ensued. All the students were arrested and escorted through the city to the House of Detention." Another account states that the trouble was caused by the supposed existence of an organization within the institution, believed to be nihilistic in its tendencies, in which a large body of the students and many of the professors and teachers were concerned. An explanation of its character was demanded by the government and refused by the rector, whereupon a large force of police and soldiers surrounded the University buildings and demanded admission. The students, apparently encouraged by the rector, forcibly resisted locking the gates and doors. The police then assumed the offensive and a riot ensued, resulting in the arrest and imprisonment of 400 of the students. The Moscow University is a state institution, under the authority of the Minister of Public Instruction, and has usually about fifteen hundred students and one hundred professors and teachers.
