

Islanders Score 6-1 Victory Here Over Millionaires

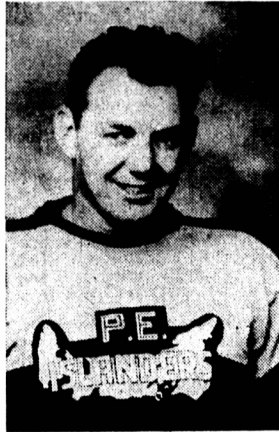
A goal hungry crew of Charlottetown Islanders led by sharp-shooting Willie Marshall satisfied their appetites at the expense of Bill Dinning's Millionaires last night by handing the Sydney team a 6-1 shellacking at the Forum.

The Islanders struck early in the first period to go into a 2-0 lead before the seven minute mark. Sydney got one of them back in the second period but the Islanders found the going to their liking in the last session and fired home four markers without a reply.

Willie Marshall spearheaded the Islanders attack by scoring three goals, two of them within 11 seconds in the last period. Don Bellringer, Denis Smith and Jim MacKenzie were the other Charlottetown marksmen.

Right winger Sam Kennedy scored Sydney's only goal in the second period while the Islanders were a man short. The score came on a gangling attack with Laurie Petersen passing the puck from behind the net onto Kennedy's stick. Hal Gordon had no chance on the shot.

Scored Four Goals Last Night

There was plenty of noise in the Islanders dressing room last night following their 6-1 victory over Sydney and not a little of it was being made by big Phil Vitale who was nominating himself for the Lady Byrd Trophy. "Why it has been three games in a row without a penalty for me," said Vitale, "and the referees are speaking to me again. Sure they are even starting to call me Phil," he added.

In addition to being happy about the win Leo Lamoureux was also pleased with the refereeing. "They are beginning to watch the other fellows now and are giving us an even break on it," he stated. "The team played good hockey tonight and the boys are beginning to realize that they have to play positional hockey, he added. "The defence played a wonderful game and Hal Gordon again turned in a great performance. Hal has played great hockey for us all along but at times things were a bit discouraging for him when the boys up front were not scoring."

"We could have won at least three or four of those first seven games had everything been on an even scale," continued Leo. "The fans have been great to support us during the losing streak but the loss of Black, Pawlyshyn, Bonhomme and Gray at the start of the season greatly affected us. You can not lose four men all at once and replace them in one day," he concluded.

Johnny missed the net on the first shot and the second attempt. Yesterday afternoon Johnny predicted the Islanders would beat the Millionaires. He also predicted that the Islanders would be in first place by Christmas. We're not going to lose too many games to those teams," he added.

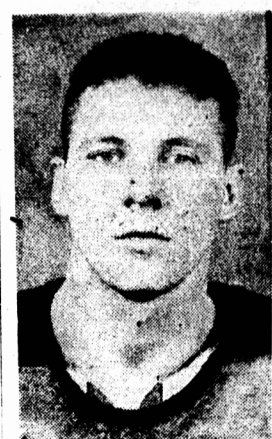

Had it not been for some inaccurate shooting the Islanders might have run the score into the double figures. As it was the 12 goals they scored in their last two games are only two less than a total of 14 in the first seven games of the season.

Eddie Sawyer Signs Contract With Phillies



PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 30 (AP)—Eddie Sawyer, the one-time college professor who managed Philadelphia Phillies to their first National League pennant since 1915, signed a new three-year contract today and promptly announced that, except for two stars, his players are "available for a profitable deal."

The exceptions, Sawyer said, are pitcher Robin Roberts and outfielder Richie Ashburn, both of whom had a great season despite the Phils' slump to fifth from their 1950 pennant race.

Club president Bob Carpenter declined to disclose terms of Sawyer's new contract, but admitted that it contained a bonus clause pegged to attendance during the three seasons.

Announcement of the contract laid to rest recurring rumors that Sawyer would be named general manager and a new field pilot appointed for the team. Carpenter didn't say so, but it was indicated that he plans to continue to function as general manager, as he has done since the death of the late Herb Pennock.

The coaching staff, Benny Bengough, Cy Perkins and Dusty Cooke, will be retained "unless they have a better opportunity elsewhere," Sawyer said.

"We're interested in adding some hitters to the ball club, some pitchers, too."

George Weiss Signs New Long Contract

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—George Weiss, the man behind the scenes in the New York Yankees great string of championships, has signed a new long-term contract as vice-president and general manager of the world champions.

Dan Topping, president and co-owner of the club, in announcing the new pact today, said "George's contract still had another year to run but we tore it up and gave him a new one."

Topping did not disclose the length or terms of the contract.

Weiss, chiefly responsible for the tremendous success of the Yankee farm system, is believed to have received about \$50,000 in the last few years, coupled with a bonus arrangement.

Employment, Payrolls At Record High

OTTAWA, Oct. 30 (CP)—Industrial employment, payrolls, and average weekly earnings reached record levels at the beginning of September, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The general index number of employment, using the 1939 base as 100, increased to 198.3 from 198.1 at August 1, and 194.1 a year earlier. The payrolls index was 407.9 compared with 400.3 the previous month and 358.5 on Sept. 1, 1950. Average weekly earnings amounted to \$59.50 against a revised average of \$45.01-16 at Aug. 1, and \$44.7 a year ago.

Advances in employment as compared with Aug. 1, varied from 0.1 per cent in Ontario and British Columbia, to 1.2 per cent in Nova Scotia and 2.3 per cent in Prince Edward Island.

Manufacturing was quieter than at Aug. 1, losses in Ontario more than offsetting moderate advances in the other provinces. Industrial disputes continued to affect the situation in some industries. Little change was shown in logging, mining and trade. Advances were recorded in construction, transportation, storage and communication.

Alexander Denies Cabinet Rumors

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Oct. 30 (CP)—Governor-General Viscount Alexander said today he is "very glad that old Winston is back at the head" of British affairs of state.

In an interview during a brief visit here, however, he dismissed all reports linking his name with possible openings in Mr. Churchill's cabinet. He said politics aren't in his line and that he wouldn't take any job about which he knows nothing.

Cockshutt Plow Shares Split; To Change Name

BRANTFORD, Ont., Oct. 30 (CP)—Shareholders of Cockshutt Plow Company at a special general meeting today approved a two-for-one stock split, creation of 1,000,000 additional shares, and application to change the company's name to Cockshutt Farm Equipment Ltd.

G. Gordon Cockshutt, president, said previously the company expects to pay an annual dividend of \$1 a share on the dividend stock beginning in 1952. The new rate would be an increase of 40 cents over the current \$1.60 rate. Rights to subscribe to the new shares will be issued shortly.

Financing defence contracts and general expansion were cited as reasons for the increased capitalization.

The firm's name present does not accurately indicate the scope of the company's operations or the variety of its products, Mr. Cockshutt said.

Tone Demands Jury Trial

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 30 (AP)—Franchot Tone demanded a jury trial today on charges that he spit in the face of columnist Florabel Muir in a night club encounter.

The actor and the red-haired writer faced each other without a word between them in Beverly Hills justice court.

The incident at Ciro's night club last night sent Tone to jail. He was released six hours later on \$500 bail.

When the case was called — a misdemeanor charge of assault and battery — lawyer Stanley Gleis said Tone was pleading innocent and requesting a jury trial.

Trial was set for Dec. 11 and the \$500 bail was continued.

TORONTO, Oct. 30 (CP)—Almost 101 weeks (give or take a day), two Grey Cup finals, 23 interviews, 18 letters and \$12,000 of the Canadian Rugby Union's money later and look what happens: a tarpaulin arrived today to protect Varsity Stadium ground from mud, rain and snow for Nov. 24.

That's the day when every football fan from Edmonton east to Montreal (although the Alouettes aren't directly concerned this year) probably will pray that the two teams fighting for the historic trophy will at least be recognizable to the 27,000-odd Varsity ticket-holders. That is Grey Cup day, the biggest on the country's sports calendar.

The tarp is a \$12,000 bundle manufactured in Canada on orders from the C.R.U. showing that the Rugby Union at least is doing its bit to prevent a repetition of the 1949 and 1950 classics when the players slipped and slipped through mud and water. After the first few plays, the fans—particularly last year—weren't sure whether they were watching water polo or football.
