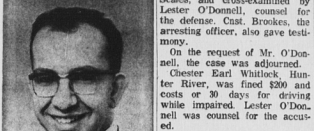

Two persons charged with possession of alcohol in a place other than their residence were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. A third appearing on the same charge was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

A case of driving without due care and attention was adjourned until June 10.

Choose Your Destination Nursing Graduates Told

"Choose your destination and objective in a field that will offer you the greatest opportunity to do what you are most interested in and forge ahead," said Miss Margaret D. McLean, Ottawa nursing consultant department national health and welfare when she addressed the 15 graduating nurses from the Prince Edward Island Hospital nursing school last evening.

The graduating exercises were held at Prince of Wales auditorium last evening. Lieutenant-Governor W. F. Hyndman presided and presented the graduates with their diplomas and Miss Barbara Pratt presented the pins.

William Hayward, chairman of the hospital board presented prizes for general proficiency to Miss Elaine Nicholson, Brad-

burne, Miss Beverly Adams, Charlottetown, and Miss Joyce Carver, Union Road. Miss Pratt, director of the School for Nursing reported on the school's activities during the past year and Miss Elaine Nicholson gave the valedictory address.

Miss McLean told the graduates that with their youth with its ideals, its energy, its courage and its enthusiasm they were the greatest resource and "the hope of nursing."

"I believe you must have a definite objective in mind when you go to work and you must try to reach it," she said. "Follow your ideals about the quality of life you want to live and the quality of nursing you want to do. You will need energy and courage too, she added, to start on the road again after small setbacks."

"Be enthusiastic, she said, love nursing and love people. Your common characteristics have made you nurses but your uncommon qualities will make you better nurses."

ANNUAL REPORT Miss Pratt stated that there were 46 student nurses enrolled in the school at the present time which occupies the top floor of the nurses residence. She reported difficulty in acquiring qualified personnel to fill staff positions.

Three courses were taught in PWC during the past year, and this allowed instructors more time for supervision in the hospital wards.

She reported that there was a general improvement in the behavior, attitude and health of the students as a result of the swimming classes held at the YMCA during the past year.

New X-Ray Techniques Are Foreseen

A former Charlottetown man, Dr. Charles Hyndman, talks confidently of new and almost revolutionary changes in X-ray technique, from the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Edmonton, Alberta, where he is the head of the radiology department.

A remote control TV X-ray unit, which when completed by July, will do away with X-rays in the dark, cut down on radiation exposure and, according to Dr. Hyndman will speed up the entire procedure.

Dr. Hyndman envisions a day when a radiologist at the Royal Alexandra will turn on a television set, inspect an X-ray transmission from the University hospital and makes his diagnosis.

Dr. Hyndman said, reports the Edmonton Journal that a doctor in Montreal has already put this procedure in to practice, diagnosing by television from his office for two hospitals.

City Tax Collections Reflect Result Of Early Billing Plan

The impact on civic economy of an earlier presentation of the budget as was done this year by the city is evident in the tax returns to date.

To date this year total taxes received are approximately \$740,000, acting city controller Carl Bradley said yesterday.

This compares with approximately \$766,716 received at City Hall for the first six months of 1962. Mr. Bradley stated the reason for comparing the five months of this year with six months of last year is that the two periods thus encompassed returns from the

first payments on real estate. However, he noted that one of the reasons for last year's total being higher was that some government grants had been received in June last year and had not been received as yet this year.

Various classifications of the taxes with their totals for five months and last year's six months figures in brackets, are: real estate \$258,627 (\$253,829); personal property \$280,241 (\$253,193); poll tax \$12,268 (\$84,981); areas \$73,400 (\$66,960); streets and sidewalks \$15,821 (\$1,287);

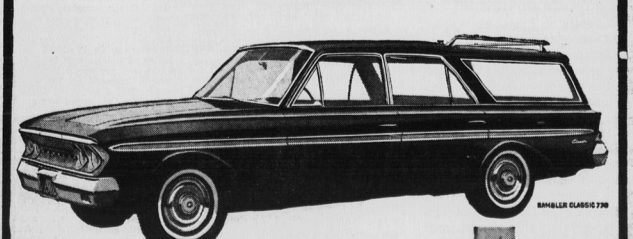
