Fatal Collision at Sea.
LONDON, Jan. 4.
A steamer, believed to be the Red Liner Nordland, which sailed from Antwerp yesterday, for New York, ran down the British barque, Childwell, off Willingen Lightships, and cut her to pieces. The barque sank and fifteen of her crew were drowned. The steamer continued on her voyage without offering any assistance. The Great Eastern Company's steamer Ipswich, rescued the Captain and the remainder of the crew, who were clinging to the only remaining mast.
