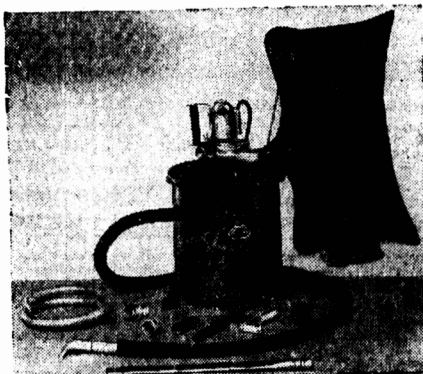

This Is Your Opportunity To Help Remedy A Bad Situation

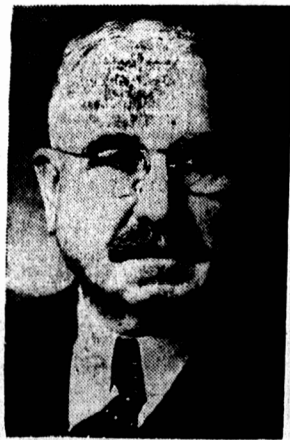
