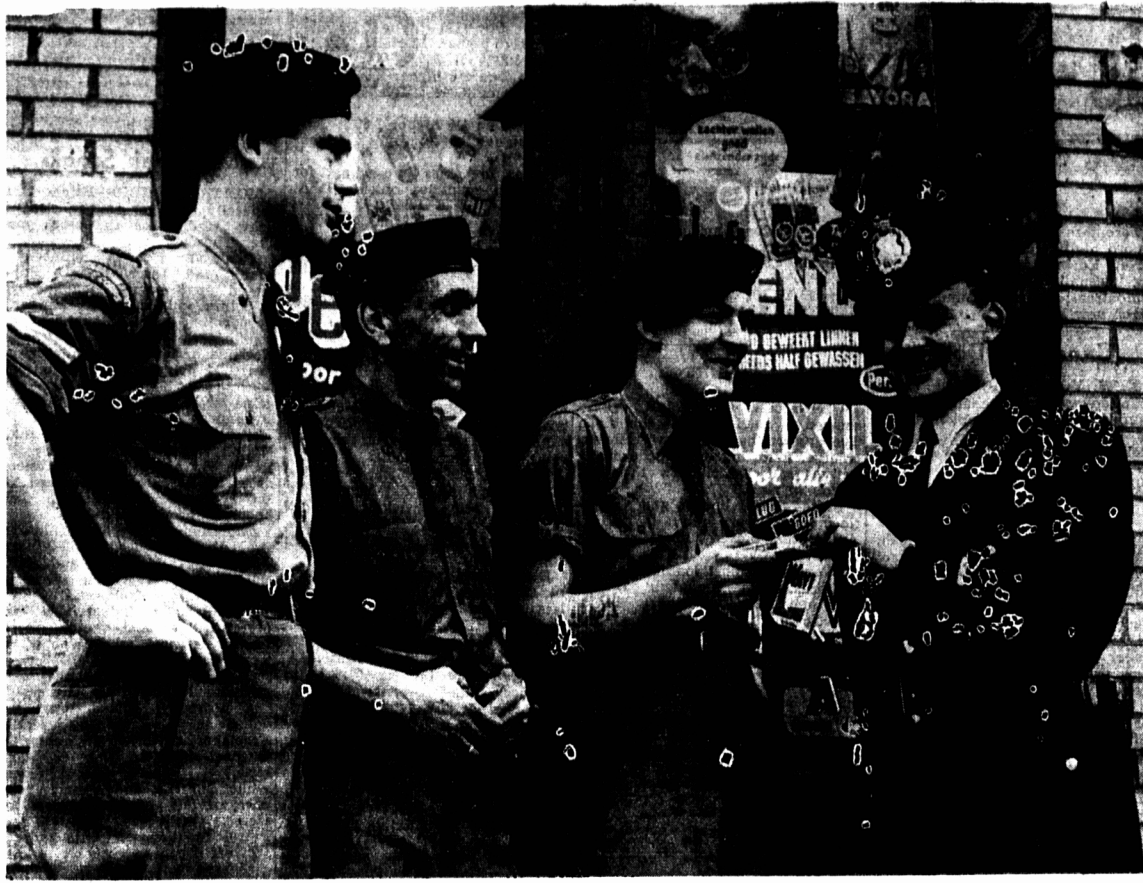

Jordan Asks U.K. To Revise Treaty

LONDON (Reuters)—Jordan has made informal approaches to Britain for amending their 1948 treaty, a foreign office spokesman said Monday.
The Jordan government's views on the treaty, which is to run until 1968, were given to Charles Duke, British ambassador in Amman, recently.
Diplomat quarters here said Britain feels any amendments to the Jordan treaty now would be premature.
But Britain would be prepared to consider revising the treaty—which entitles here to air and military bases in Jordan—in the context of any new Middle East defence project.

Arab Statesmen Begin New Moves To Set Up Middle East Defence System

LONDON (AP)—Arab statesmen have started new moves—with strong British and United States support—to set up a Middle East defence system against Communist aggression.
Qualified diplomats report a flurry of exchanges among the Middle East capitals on plans to build a security network tied in with the West. London and Washington are encouraging this trend with promises of military and economic aid.
Organization of a Middle East defence system—extending over the oil-laden land bridge between Europe, Asia and Africa—would close the last gap in the West's defence ring around the Communist bloc.

IRAQ TAKES LEAD
Iraq's Premier Nuri Said has taken the lead by proposing that some of the eight Arab League states link up with the Turkey-Pakistan alliance. Turkey is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
The 66-year-old Iraqi premier is reported well advanced in his negotiations with Turkey for an alliance and possibly full membership in the Turkey-Pakistan pact.
Western diplomats find Egypt, once the chief opponent of Arab military co-operation with the West, moving toward a reversal of her traditional stand. Two re-

cent developments have made this possible:
1. Cairo and London have signed an agreement to end the bitterly-opposed British occupation of the Suez canal zone.
2. Egypt's Premier Abdel Gamal Nasser has cracked down on the extremist Muslim Brotherhood, which has led the country's anti-West movement.

TALKS WENT WELL
Informants said Egypt is due to open negotiations soon with Turkey on some kind of association. Preliminary talks in Ankara have gone well. The link probably will fall short of a full military pact—but it will be a step in that direction.
