### PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

made use of the following words: "I have all respect for that gentleman, and do not mean to say that he would depart one hair's breadth from his duty; but in justice to himself and to avoid suspicion he should have declined the appointment. The whip was there and the premier would have used it if he dared." My remarks on that report show that every syllable of it is damaging to the premier and to the trustees and that the lash was not used further on in this article we find it said: "Hardly had Mr. McKinnon made his astounding and unfounded charge against the Doctor, when Premier Farquharson, Hon. P. Sinclair and Hon. Mr. McLean were upon their feet and requested the Speaker to take down the hon. gentleman's words." Now I appeal to the House in this matter. The Premier was outside the House at this time and neither Mr. McLean nor Mr. Sinclair took any notice of the remark. If they heard it at all they did not take any exception to it much less request you, Mr. Speaker, to take the words down. Although the remarks were made near the middle of my speech, as reference to my notes will show, it was not till I was through that the Premier got up and said he was told outside of the House that I made certain remarks which he went on to repeat, and it was not my remarks that the hon. Commissioner of Public Works and the member from Springton objected to but the gossip that the Premier picked up outside of this House. We find further on in the same article "Recognizing the gravity of his insinuation Mr. McKinnon feebly attempted to explain what he meant." I deny that I offered any explanation or that any explanation was necessary. I rose and repeated the words, as I do now, and they are no reflection on Dr. Conroy, but a credit to him that he would put his name to a report so damaging to the Government under the circumstances. In further contradiction of the Patriot I may state that the Guardian reporter was behind me took down his notes and published a report of my speech and I understand that the Patriot got the same type and suppressed the last part of the report as it appeared in the Guardian because that part of the report showed there was no truth in this article. Now, Mr. Speaker, I think that the editor of that paper should be brought to the bar of this House to answer for his conduct and it would be a warning to him in future not to try and slander members of this House when he could not put up any defence for his party.

The Leader of the Government said in reply that this was not the time to discuss this matter; it should have been taken up with closed doors.

Mr. M. McKinnon—According to the rules of the House the time to rise to a question of privilege is before the orders of the day are called.

Mr. Farquharson admitted that he was not in the House when the remark in reference to Dr. Conroy was made.

Hon. J. R. McLean said that he was not in the House when the remark was made, but on hearing the Premier he testified to Dr. Conroy's worth as a man and a commissioner.

Hon. P. Sinclair declared that there was no misrepresentation, that the article in the Patriot was correct.

Mr. A. J. McDonald said that it was customary when any hon. gentleman made an explanation or denial his word was taken; but that courtesy was not extended to the Opposition by the Government.

After some further discussion the matter dropped.

SCHOOL BOARD.—The monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The enrolment was 1,359 and the percentage of attendance 86 9/10; 22 cases of corporal punishment. The following petition signed by 216 parents was read: "Learning that a petition signed by a number of citizens has been presented to your Board asking that the daily course in the day-schools shall consist of two sessions instead of one as at present; we, the undersigned citizens, do hereby protest against any such change being made, and do also express opinion that if such change were made it would result in a serious falling off in the attendance at the second session and consequently would impair the usefulness of the schools." It was decided to lay the matter on the table till the next meeting. A committee was appointed to make arrangements for the issuing of debentures to cover cost of plumbing in Prince Street School, \$1357, and the janitor's cottage, \$704. The closing of the schools was ordered for the 28th June, in the following order: West Kent, Prince Street, Queen Square. They will open on September 4th.
