D. 1878, at the hour of twelve o'clock, noon, under and by virtue of a Power of Sale contained in an Indenture of Mortgage, bearing date the Twenty-first day of April, A. D. 1876, and made between John Smith, of Summerside, in Prince County, in Prince Edward Island, shop keeper and grocer, and Christy Smith, his wife, of the one part, and Catherine N. Stamper, of Charlottetown, in Queen's County, in said Island, widow, of the other part.
