Mr. M'Donald having come to the door, was mistaken in the darkness of the night for a stranger, and fired at. The hon. gentleman has since been brought to town, and is reported not dangerously wounded.

Picton, Aug. 8.—The Schr. Seafarer, of P. E. Island, drifted on shore at Daniel's Harbour, a total wreck—a few barrels of Salt on board—no account of the crew.

The Bark Gift, of Sunderland, Capt. Gray, from Montreal, bound to England, was wrecked near Portland Creek, Newfld., on the 16th July, with a cargo of Indian meal—vessel and cargo a total wreck.

The new Brigantine "Rose," from P. E. Island, bound to England with a cargo of deals, was wrecked at Green Island about 14 days since. Wreck and cargo sold for £190.
