THERE was quite a boom before His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. One drunk was disposed of for \$4 or 20 days. Five Scott Act cases came on. In the first the summons was dismissed, the second was adjourned at the request of the prosecutor for further evidence, the third resulted in the defendant being convicted of a second offence, the fourth defendant was convicted of a third offence, and the fifth case stands over, as there was some doubt as to whether the defendant had been served with the summons. The two cases against a Queen Street man, charged with tampering with a witness, fell through, as a writ of prohibition had been served out of the Supreme Court in one of them, and the prosecutor withdrew the other. The graveyard case was finished, and resulted in the defendant being sent up for trial to the Supreme Court, in the meantime to be discharged on his own recognizance in the sum of \$100.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Canadian Wimbledon Successful Maritime Men.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1. The two long ranges of the Dominion of Canada match were shot to-day and the aggregate series completed by four o'clock.

The result of the days work has been most happy for the New Brunswick team, as two of its members stand at the top of the grand aggregate. The champion is Lieut. E. A. Smith, and he wins the N. R. A. medal with 257 points. Next to him is Sergt. Adams, of St. John, who takes the D. R. A. medal with six points less. The third winner is Case, of Halifax. So the Maritime men have had their own way in aggregate.

In the competition for the London Merchants' Palms, by teams of 8 men from Provincial Rifle Associations, Ontario took first prize, \$100, with a score of 638; Nova Scotia second, \$80, with a score of 628; Quebec, 619, New Brunswick, 619, P. E. Island, 578, and Manitoba 576. The Governor-General's list is to be fired to-morrow morning, and the presentation of prizes will conclude the meeting of 1887, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Exciting and Sad. PRINCETOWN, Mo., Sept. 1. At the Mercer County fair, yesterday, Randall Blakeley, a half-breed Indian, made a balloon ascension, hanging to a trapeze bar. In the ascent the balloon shot up suddenly, giving Blakeley a wrench. He was unable to pull himself up to the bar, but managed to hold himself up by the loop, which he had drawn around his wrist. After travelling about a mile and half, reaching the altitude of 2000 feet, the balloon began to descend and the poor fellow's strength gave out when within 500 feet of earth. His grip relaxed and he fell alighting on his feet in a corn field. His thighs were broken and driven into his body.

The Fisheries Commission. OTTAWA, Sept. 1. Hon. Messrs. Foster and Thompson are mentioned in connection with Canada's representatives on the fishery commission. Politicians seem agreed that neither Sir John Macdonald nor Sir Charles Tupper will act, and that the duties will therefore devolve upon Thompson who, being a good lawyer, will be thoroughly acquainted with the points involving International law.

The Ennis Meeting. LONDON, Sept. 1. The Daily News, referring to the proclamation of the proposed meeting at Ennis, says it hopes the promoters of the meeting will be content to protest by formally assembling and then quietly dispersing if called upon to do so. "They will thus," adds the News, "put the Government wholly in the wrong."

The Bulgarian Question. LONDON, Sept. 1. The Standard's Sofia correspondent telegraphs that he has authority for stating that Gen. Eurenth's entrance into Bulgaria will be forcibly resisted if necessary.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Street Hawking. SIR.—For some time past your correspondent has observed a steady increase in the number of persons from the surrounding country who regularly hawk vegetables, etc., through all parts of our city. It is well known to the taxpayers that an expensive building has been erected and sustained by them for the accommodation of the farmers' wives and daughters, for the use of which a very small toll is demanded. It is therefore an injustice to them to allow others to peddle all over town without a license, and a much greater one to those who have to pay taxes to keep the streets in order. Again, our truckmen are not allowed to drive horses and carts without first procuring a license, and every citizen keeping a horse is required to pay a tax for it. Now, is this right that farmers for miles around, who never contribute a dollar directly or indirectly towards any city improvement, should have all the privileges and, more than our citizens enjoy, and pay nothing for it. As a citizen I protest against this practice being allowed to continue, as often double prices are demanded by these imposters, to that asked by the regular occupants of the market House. I would suggest that a bye-law be passed at the first meeting of your City Council regulating this growing nuisance, and compel all such street peddlers to procure a license for so doing.
