P. E. I. provides tourists with varied entertainment

There are many, many ways to enjoy your summer holiday on Prince Edward Island. This picturesque province has excellent sports facilities and visitors to the Garden of the Gulf will be surprised at what Prince Edward Island has to offer in the way of recreation. And you can enjoy yourself to the fullest at very little cost. Harness racing must be classified as the major sport as far as spectators are concerned. Charlottetown and Summerside each have splendid tracks and offer keen racing with pari-mutuel betting available. There are several other tracks in the province which feature matinee racing without the betting thrown in. Racing begins here early in June and continues through until October. Summerside will have its biggest race features during Lobster Carnival Week and Charlottetown proudly presents its greatest attraction during the annual Old Home Week

show in mid-August. Lobster Carnival Week goes in the middle of July. Trout fishermen should find Prince Edward Island a real delight. There is plenty of river fishing where salt water beauties can be taken. Ponds and streams offer the anglers loads of fresh water trout which make a delightful meal at any hour of the day. **NO RELOCATIONS** Many ponds are provided with boats which can be rented most reasonably. The provincial government each year increases the number of government-sponsored fishing locations and this year, 1965, sees several new ones attracting customers. By-pass dams are on the increase. They have proved popular in the past and will undoubtedly continue to be so. Of course, deep sea fishing is increasing in popularity all the time and in another section of this Tourist Edition you can

find out all details of this great pastime. You just leave everything in the hands of experienced fishermen who get you and your party at the choicest fishing grounds about three miles off shore. The fun starts in earnest then and you go seeking the many variety of fish available at such a location. This kind of entertainment gives you a delightful boat ride in addition to the fishing excursion. It all goes in for the one price. You don't need any license to go out for such an excursion. Of course, a great many visitors want good golf facilities and Prince Edward Island has those in large numbers. Belvedere Golf and Winter Club course, Summerside course, Green Gables are a few of the spots golfers can get in their practice. Green fees are most reasonable and you'll find hospitality tops in all of these clubs.

Golf professionals are available at the three clubs mentioned above. There are smaller, private courses at some of the Island's resort hotels. **OTHER RECREATION** Tennis, bowling on the green, croquet, shuffleboard, quoits or horseshoes are other popular pastimes which you can enjoy. Sailing and water skiing are also part of the Island program of entertainment. Members of the Yacht Club in Charlottetown and Summerside and boating enthusiasts at Montague are always pleased to take the visitor for a sail or boat ride. Some resorts also have their own sailboats. **HUNTING** September is one of the best weather months in Prince Edward Island. The same is true for most of October. In October, when the foliage is at its best, there is an extra treat in store for the sportsman. The hunting season is open!

Cuba tour organized

TORONTO (CP)—A six-week tour of Cuba by 100 Canadian university students has been organized for this summer by university Latin-American study clubs in conjunction with the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, the committee said Thursday. Half the students, from 17 universities in nine provinces, will leave Canada June 13 and the others July 18. The students will travel the island, hold discussions with Cuban students and work on some project during their stay.

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Exhibitions high on tourist plans

Agricultural exhibitions naturally play a large and an important part in the annual calendar of this basically agricultural province. They serve as show places for some of the best livestock and other products of the farm. And they offer for visitors the best possible opportunities for meeting relatives and friends. It's been said, for instance, that a visitor to this Island can meet more people in several hours at the Old Home Week and Provincial Exhibition here in August than he or she could in as many weeks of travel throughout the province. Dates of Old Home Week are August 16 to 21, and it is the biggest attraction of the year. There are horse races that annually attract some of the best horses in the Maritimes—The Evening Patriot sponsors two of the most colorful races — and this part of the show lasts throughout the fun-filled week. This year for the first time the exhibition people have announced great changes in the number of classes of cattle that are permitted to enter. **GREATER PRIZES** Prize money has been more than doubled and a total of \$14,000 is available in dairy cattle classes, for example. The

amount available for beef cattle is smaller but it is also far in excess of what it was in previous years. There are only two dairy bull classes and in each case the entry must be from a dam that has produced 115 percent more in breed class averages, which means the dam must have been at least 15 percent better in production than the average of the cows in her breed across Canada. Female classes are for two-year-old, three-year-old, four-year old and mature cows with only one class in each age group, instead of dry and in milk as it was in the past. There is a class for four animals bred and owned by the exhibitor, not more than one of which can be a male. There is an interbreed un-uttered class, and in this class the cows must have production records of 125 percent of the national average in the breed. The prize money runs from a top of \$70 for first prize down to 10 dollars for tenth position. The beef classes offer prize money from a top of \$30 for first down to \$10 for tenth. **NEW CLASS** The most marked change is in the manner in which the steer

class will be judged, and this is a new class for the exhibition here. Only 25 points out of the possible of 100 will be decided on the judging of the live animal. The other 75 points will depend on carcass qualities that will only be discernible after the animal is slaughtered, dressed and the meat cut into the desirable parts. The carcass points include 18 for carcass weight per day of age, which is a practical method of judging the carcass; 15 points for the area of loin eye adjusted to 100 pounds warm carcass weight, which is a technical approach to the eating quality; 15 points for distribution of fat and the fat thickness over loin and another 18 points for carcass grade, conformation and quality. The Summerside Lobster Carnival and Agriculture Fair opens the show season on the week of July 12 to 17. The Prince County Exhibition will be held at Alberton on August 25 and 26, the Eastern Kings Exhibition at Souris is on September 1 and the Egmont Bay and Mont Carmel exhibition is slated for the same day. The Provincial Plowing Match and Agricultural Fair Association hold their two-day

show at Dundas on August 8 and 9 and the Crapaud Exhibition date this year is August 25. **PRINCESS WEDS** PARIS (Reuters) — Princess Anne de France, daughter of the Count of Paris, pretender to the French throne, was married Tuesday to Prince Carlos de Bourbon in a civil ceremony at Louveciennes, near here. A religious ceremony will be held today in the Saint-Louis Chapel at Dreux, Normandy.

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
