## B.E. Games Set For Today; Aussies Seen As Favorites

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)—With only hours remaining before the opening of the 8th British Empire Games, the experts are picking Canada's track and field contingent and swimmers as the country's main hope for medals.

They concede the possibility of surprises — as this is the strongest team-Canada has ever sent to an international meet. But on the form, it appears the swimmers and the runners, jumpers and throwers, hold the best chance of all 108 of her athletes of upsetting the traditional England-Australia monopoly on the games.

Sport-by-sport, it shapes up this way:

Swimming: Australia, as always, is expected to make the biggest medal haul, but Canada could displace England as the second strongest Commonwealth nation in the pool. Australia is expected to find it difficult to duplicate the 1962 feat in Perth, in which she won 17 of 27 titles and, in all, 41 of a possible 81 medals. One reason is expected to be Vancouver's Elaine (Mighty Mouse) Tanner, at 15 expected to dominate the program as holder of Commonwealth records for the 110 and 220 butterfly events and the 440 yard individual medley. Ralph Hutton of Ocean Falls, B.C., should make a fight of the backstroke events. The individual medley could be a toss-up between Hutton, Australian Peter Reynolds and Sandy Gilchrist of Ocean Falls.

Track and field: The high spot of the entire games could be the three-mile race, expected to be a spectacular clash between two world record-holders — Ron Clarke of Australia and Kipchog Keino of Kenya. Canada is not contesting this event. The powerful Australian, a silver medalist at Perth, is a natural front-runner. Keino, known for his devastating lap-kick, could become the first non-white winner of this event. Track experts are conceding the 440 to Trinidad's Wendell-Moyle, but leaving the 880 wide open between Bill Crothers of Markham, Ont., John Bouterline of England and Jamaica's George Kerr.

In the sprints, the most impressive credentials belong to Vancouver's Harry Jerome, co-holder of world records at 100 yards and 100 metres. In addition, he has done the 220 in a surprising 20.4 seconds. Crothers, second behind Peter Snell of New Zealand in the 800 metres at the Tokyo Olympics two years ago, had been conceded to be the Commonwealth's top half-mile runner since Snell's retirement but has been slow rounding into form this year.

Others highly rated in their fields are Dave Steen of Burnaby, B.C., shot-put, and George Pace of Toronto, discus.

Cycling: Australia is the power here, although facing the biggest threat in years. New Zealand is traditionally second in these events—but this time Trinidad has come up with a cyclist to watch, Roger Gibbon is a hot favorite to win the 1,000-metre time trial and the sprint. Canada has entries in the 1,000-metre time trial, the 4,000-metre pursuit and the road races.
