Mr. Stirling Clark, well known merchant of Mt. Stewart, was a recent visitor to Savage Harbour.

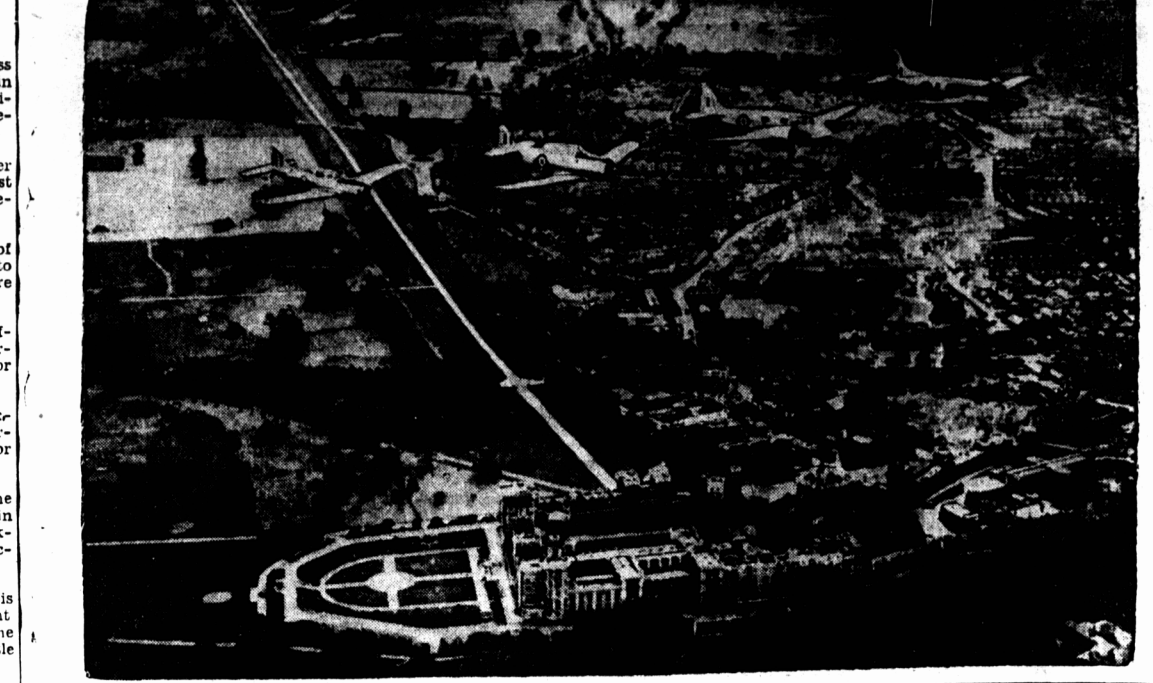
Mr. Clark was on a trip to try out a new type of mud grip tire which if it proves satisfactory will soon be offered to the public.

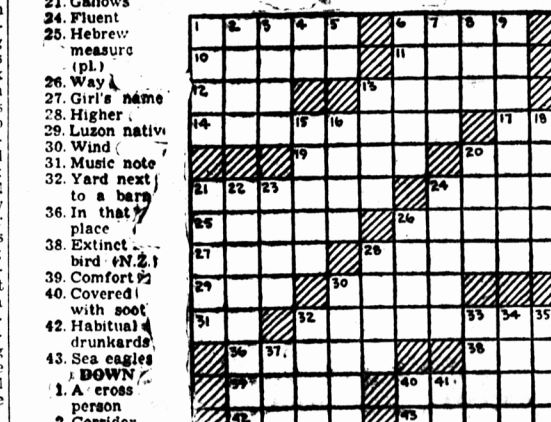
Whim Road and Vicinity
