Montreal Second Sacker Named Most Valuable Player In Int. League

NEW YORK, Sept. 2 — (AP) — (James) Junior) Gilliam, Montreal's switch-hitting second baseman, was named the International Baseball League's most valuable player of 1952 today.

He won the honor two years ago after being dropped by the Springfield, Mass., club in spring training as not good enough for the International League.

Gilliam, 23, was named on 19 of the 28 ballots cast by newspaper men. He received 175 points with Roy Weatherly, veteran Baltimore outfielder, second with 138. Harry Walker, Rochester's manager-outfielder, was third with 112.

Gilliam, owned by the Brooklyn Dodgers, is the third Montreal player to receive the award. Jim Bloodworth was the first, in 1948, and Bob Morgan the second in 1949.

Archie Wilson, Buffalo outfielder who won in 1951, now is with Boston Red Sox.

Gilliam, a rare speedster, is batting .312 and tied for league leadership in two-base hits with 37. He is runner-up in runs scored, 100, and in stolen bases, 17. He also is credited with seven triples and nine home runs.

A native of Nashville, Tenn., Gilliam began playing pro ball in 1945 with the Nashville Black Volunteers of the Negro Southern League. In 1950 he received a spring training trial with Springfield Cubs but was released before the season opened.

Signed by the Royals in 1951, he batted .287 in 152 games, drew 117 walks, scored as many runs, and was elected to the Shaughnessy circuit all-star team.

On June 17, 1951, in a double-header at Buffalo, Gilliam collected eight hits, three walks and a sacrifice in 12 plate appearances, ending up the feat with a grand-slam home run.

Last June, in a twin-bill at Syracuse, he banded out seven hits, including two home runs.

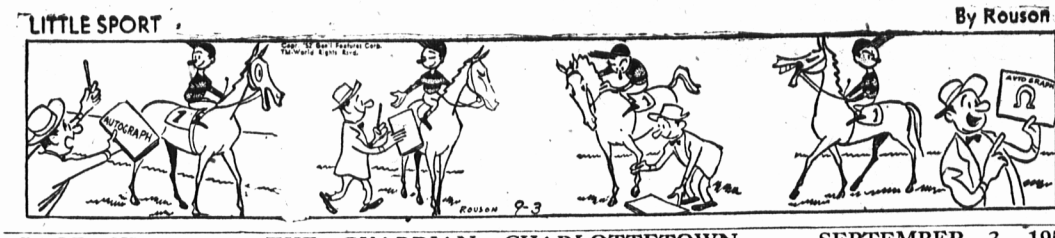

EDMONTON, Sept. 2 — (CP) — A year ago Winnipeg Blue Bombers apparently figure that old Joe (The Toe) Aguirre was all washed up. But no one can convince Edmonton football fans that the one-time Los Angeles Dons player belongs on the bench.

Catching on as line coach with Eskimos of the Western Canada conference this season, Aguirre went into action when injuries knocked out two first-string middlebacks. His "comeback" has been sensational.

Rollin Prather from Kansas was moved from his end position to middle and Aguirre took over Prather's big boots.

Monday night the Eskies were trailing the unbeaten Calgary Stampeders 10-3 going into the last quarter. Then Aguirre started to click with help from the nifty passing arm of quarterback Claude Arnold.

Arnold, who last played in 1950 with the University of Oklahoma, threw two touchdown passes to Aguirre. Joe converted both. Edmonton got two more fourth quarter points when Stampeders were routed after booming Aguirre kicks.

Aguirre had kicked Edmonton's first point and had caught a forward that paved the way for Eskies other two first-half points.

During the game he caught eight passes from Arnold for an aggregate gain of 204 yards.

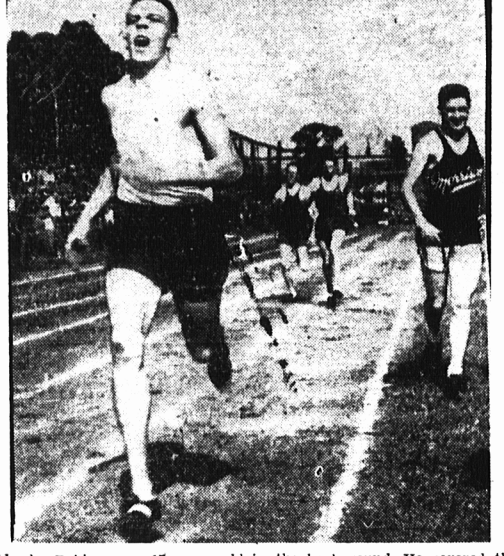
The Riverside Golf and Country Club golfer drove through rain and high winds to regain the title taken last year by Dr. E.O. Turner of Fredericton.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. Sept. 2 — (AP) — One of Uncle Sam's favorite tennis bunnies was punctured and practically ruined today when Bob Perry, a 19-year-old Phenomenus junior grade, from Los Angeles, failed completely to live up to his lavish billing in the third round of the United States amateur championships.

Playing for the first time in the big stadium, the tall youngster who had been touted to spark America's challenge for the Davis Cup against Australia next winter took fright and went down before seasoned Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills by scores of 6-1, 6-2, 6-0.

Flam, fourth seeded U. S. star, had been expected to win. But Perry's failure to give him a contest was a sharp disappointment to the crowd and to the Davis Cup selectors who watched in pained silence.

"It means we'll have to start all over in our planning, I guess," one of them said later. "Perry is so woefully short in several important departments that there isn't a chance he will be ready for a couple of years."

Yankees Shutout Boston Twice To Strengthen Lead Over Cleveland

Thanks to stalwart pitching by three moundmen, two of them former National League players, New York Yankees blanked Boston Red Sox twice in an American League day-night doubleheader Tuesday, 5-0 and 4-0.

The double triumph increased the Yankees' lead to 2 1/2 games over the idle Cleveland Indians.

Rookie Tommy Gorman twirled an eight-hitter in the opening game. In the nightcap, Ewell Blackwell and Johnny Sain, a pair of veteran righthanders plucked from the National League, combined to shut out the Red Sox with five hits.

The victories extended the Yankees' streak to five straight. The Sox have lost seven of their last eight and have scored only once in their last 36 innings. They are 1-2 games off the pace.

Blackwell, purchased from Cincinnati last week, permitted four singles in five innings in his first start for the world champions. He tired in the humidity and was removed for a pinch hitter, Sain finished, allowing one more single to win the National League pennant but they performed like novices — in dropping a two-night doubleheader to Philadelphia Phillies. The Phils slaughtered the Brooks twice with a combination of brilliant pitching and long ball hitting. Robin Roberts won his 22nd victory in the opener 8-2, while Carl Drews waltzed to his 13th win 9-3 in the nightcap.

Willie Jones rapped his 14th and 15th home runs, while Del Ennis collected his 16th round-tripper, a single, double and three runs batted in. Jackie Robinson's 17th homer in the first inning and a single in the fourth were the only runs off Roberts.

In the second game the Phillies blasted rookie Ray Moore from the mound with a single run in the first inning and three more in the second.

Chicago White Sox belted 12 hits, including Minnie Minoso's homer, 16 trim Detroit Tigers 7-4 and swept a doubleheader from the American League tail-enders.

The Palcosho won the opener 4-3 on Rocco Krsulich's two-run triple in the ninth inning. Kranich's blow came off Virgil (Double No-Hit) Trucks just after the Detroit veteran had replaced Hal White, who was charged with the loss.

Mike Fornieles, 20-year-old Cuban righthander pitched his first major league game, held Philadelphia Athletics to one hit as Washington scored 5-0 victory in the second game of a doubleheader. The Senators took the opener 3-2 in 10 innings.

Washington registered only three hits in each game. Fornieles led the A's hitless in the last 7-2-3 innings of the nightcap after Joe Astroth singled in the second inning.

The A's Bob Hooper forced across the winning run in the opener by walking Jackie Jensen with the bases loaded with one out in the 10th.
