I'm sure all participants would agree that the outdoor education weekend was an enjoyable experience, enabling us to learn many things about our environment and to form new friendships.

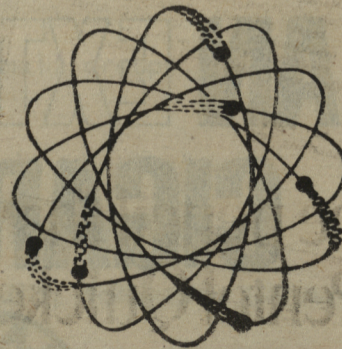
