

Revenue Minister McCann Has Resigned Directorship

OTTAWA (CP)—Revenue Minister McCann's controversial dual role as minister of the crown and director of a private trust company was ended by the minister a month ago.

The prime minister made his surprise announcement in reply to Opposition Leader Drew's demand he be told to resign the directorship of the Guaranty Trust Co. or resign the cabinet post he has held for 10 years.

It climaxed a dispute which had been going on for nearly three months over Dr. McCann's alleged role in Ontario's Dempsey political case.

Mr. St. Laurent repeated a previous statement that he is satisfied Dr. McCann did no wrong in the Dempsey affair. He asserted there was no clash between the minister's private interests and public responsibilities.

He said Dr. McCann left the company not because he felt there was anything wrong in the association but because a large number of Commons members

thought his connection with Guaranty Trust was undesirable. The prime minister's remarks also shed some light on the circumstances surrounding the transfer of information from Dr. McCann to Premier Frost at the federal-provincial conference here April 27.

Opposition members had charged that Dr. McCann showed the premier photostatic copies of receipts for \$6,800 in election campaign contributions made in 1951 by the late John Drohan, wealthy Barry's Bay, Ont., lumberman, to James S. Dempsey, Progressive Conservative member of the Ontario legislature for Renfrew South. The constituency is represented federally by Dr. McCann.

Mr. Dempsey lost premier Frost's support in the campaign for the June 9 Ontario election for not reporting the contributions but he still retained the seat as an Independent Progressive Conservative.

Opposition members' questions had been whetted by the fact that the Drohan estate was administered by Guaranty Trust.

Mr. St. Laurent said Wednesday he heard that Dr. McCann had photostatic copies of certain receipts. One of them he showed to Premier Frost, who as provincial treasurer administers suc-

cession duty laws. He indicated the receipt was for money handed to Mr. Dempsey by Mr. Drohan for an interest in provincial crown forest lands.

NO ASSETS DECLARED
He said Dr. McCann was inquiring because there was nothing in the assets declared by the Drohan estate which seemed to correspond with assets which should have been acquired under the transaction for which the receipt was given.

"That was all that was done by the minister of national revenue," Mr. St. Laurent said. The prime minister's statement was the first information from the government about the information which was shown to Premier Frost. Dr. McCann had repeatedly said that tax files of secrecy prevented him from telling his side of the story.

Mammoth Airlift To Bring 2,000 Scouts To Jamboree

LONDON (CP)—A mammoth, four-day airlift early in August will carry 2,000 British and French boy scouts to a 55-nation scouting jamboree near Niagara Falls, Ont.

In contrast to the span-the-Atlantic air operation, three Brazilian scouts are driving a second-hand jeep thousands of miles from South America to the campsite on the shore of Lake Ontario.

Other scouts are travelling by ship and plane from countries scattered around the globe.

FIRST IN CANADA
The big attraction—the eighth world jamboree of scouts—is being staged for the first time in history in North America, at a one-mile-square camp at Niagara-On-The-Lake.

The Canadian-born international director of boy scouts, Maj.-Gen. D. C. Spry, describes the camp "as a huge investment in citizenship—a place where scouts from around the world can meet and make new friends."

The last jamboree, held in Austria in 1952, was easily accessible to European scouts, he said. But this year, for the first time, it is being held in North America, and 1,000 Canadian scouts will attend. Another 1,500 will come from the United States.

The remainder will congregate at the campsite from 33 countries. Most of them are expected to be in Canada by Aug. 16, two days before the opening Aug. 18.

During the camp, the youths will participate in scouting competitions, games, campfires, and tours.

PARADE IN TORONTO
On Aug. 26, the scouts will move en masse—by train, bus and boat—to Toronto for a gala parade at the opening ceremonies of the Canadian National Exhibition.

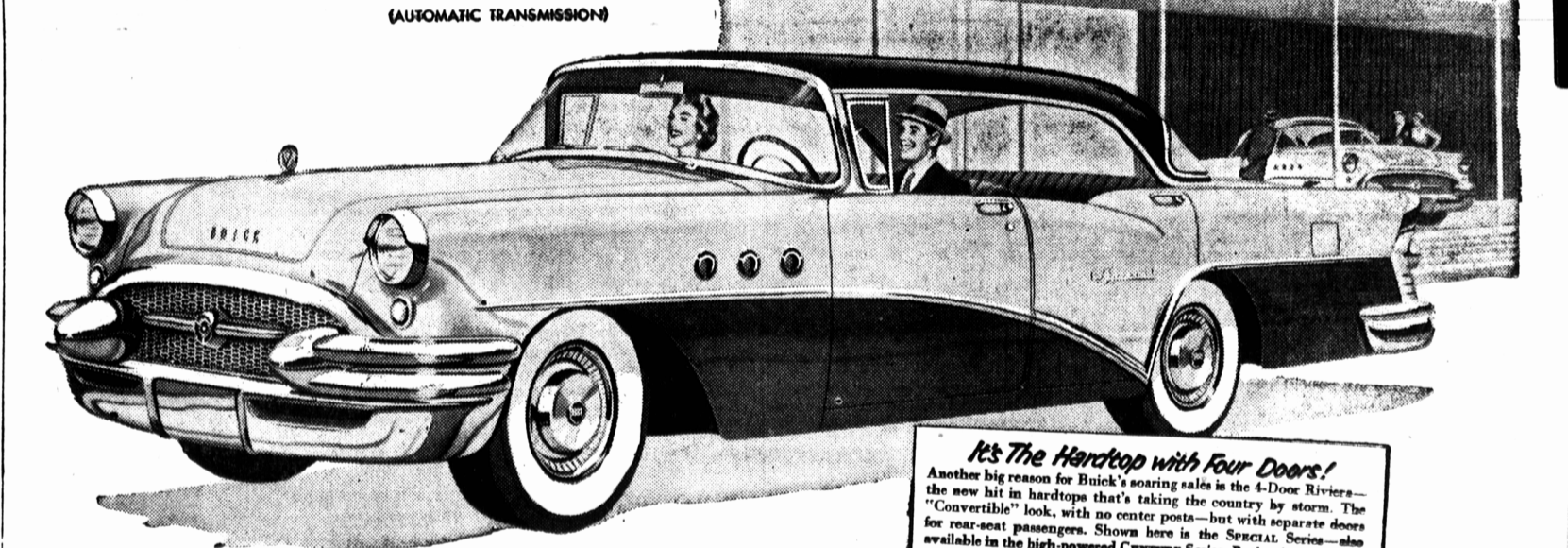
