A large and representative public meeting of the citizens met on August 1st, at which a committee of seven were chosen to make an appeal to the generous public for aid, to distribute to the deserving equitably all contributions that may be received.

The committee named consists of the four resident ministers, viz., Rev's Haverstock, Williams, Driffield and Mackintosh, with S M Lowe, E J Embree and Alex Kennedy, Esquires.

Votes of thanks were heartily given to the ladies for their heroic efforts during the fire, to the fire departments of the towns of Amherst and Pictou, and to the captains and sailors of foreign ships in port for their able assistance. At a committee meeting, held on August 2nd, S. M. Lowe was chosen chairman, E. J. Embree, secretary, and Rev. R. Williams, treasurer of committee. An appeal is now to be made to the public for aid, as some of the families are homeless and destitute and require immediate assistance. Nearly 40 buildings were burned, and of this number 18 were dwelling houses. Any contributions will be thankfully received and duly acknowledged.
