SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Martin Hogan Loses His Life at Sentner's Mills.

A sad drowning accident occurred at Sentner's Mills, about eight miles from the city, on the Loyalist Road, this morning, the victim being Martin Hogan, a well known resident of Charlottetown.

It seems that early this morning Hogan, in company with his nephew Arthur Hogan, Eddie White and William Macdonald, drove out to Sentner's Mills to fish trout.

Martin went out on a raft of logs to the middle of the pond and then fell off. Being unable to swim he soon sank to rise no more alive.

Immediately after the accident Neil McNeill, Esq., J. P. of Milton, was notified. He proceeded at once to the scene, had a raft made, and secured the body which was found in eight or nine feet of water. Mr. McNeill then came to town to notify the coroner.

Martin Hogan was about thirty-five years of age, and lived with his brother on Clark street. His wife died some years ago.

The deceased was popular with his associates, and his sad death is deeply deplored.

SALISBURY'S HIGH PLACE.

Lord Selborne on the Situation.

LONDON, June 16.—The Earl of Selborne, under secretary of the colonies, addressing the Conservative Association at Brampton last evening, said that the rapprochement of England and America was "a work entitling Lord Salisbury to a place in the country's annals." "I know of no other achievement," said Lord Selborne, "that will tend more to the benefit of the human race. "Yet three years ago Lord Salisbury was denounced for 'knuckling down to America,' just as he is now denounced for a weak-kneed Chinese policy. Let the country have patience. The Chinese question is only at its beginning. If we wish to preserve our commercial rights and privileges in China intact, we must be prepared for a land war on a large scale."
