Brighton Tigers Win Major Prize In British Hockey

LONDON, Jan. 23 (CP)—Brighton Tigers, led by Montreal's free-wheeling Bobby Lee, nosed out Streatham by one point to win the Autumn Cup, one of the major prizes of the British hockey season.

Tigers clinched the honors by swamping Wembley Lions 8-2 in the final game. Lee scored two goals and assisted on three others. Despite the smallpox scare which has sharply cut attendance at most entertainment spots in Brighton, a capacity crowd of 3,000 cheered Tigers to their second cup triumph. They last won the trophy in 1946-47.

After the game the victors drank each other's health in champagne from the cup, which was presented by J. F. (Bunny) Ahearn, secretary of the British Ice Hockey Association. Then, with far less enthusiasm, the players were paraded before the club physician to be vaccinated.

Honors for top-scoring defenceman went to Jean-Paul Lacroix from Embrun, Ont. He collected 22 scoring points for Brighton.

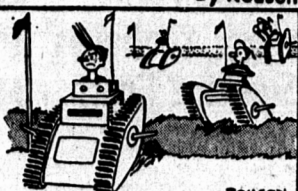

As has been the case many times already this season, local hockey enthusiasts who didn't attend Monday night's clash here between Islanders and Hawks, missed out on seeing a smart game of hockey. Although the final score was 6-1 for the locals, it was a really tight contest for two full periods with the Hawks holding a 1-0 edge after a wide-open first frame and Islanders in front 2-1 at the close of the sandwich session that came up with plenty of aggressive hockey that provided a thrill a minute.

With the assistance of one of the coldest nights of the season, the Forum management had a perfect sheet of ice for the boys to perform over and both squads took full advantage of it to hit a fast clip that was the result of shifty passing attacks and wide-open play and exciting scoring attempts.

The goaltending was of a particularly high calibre, and both Les Colvin and Hal Gordon had to look good and act fast in those two first sessions to keep the scoring down to its minimum of three goals in those frames. Colvin was especially hot in the first frame when pressing Islanders forwards crowded in around his cage repeatedly with dangerous, aggressive scoring attempts, and although some erratic shooting on the part of Islanders aided his cause, Colvin performed sensationally at times. Colvin handled 10 shots in the opening frame and 11 in the second, while Gordon turned aside seven and nine.

Fans also had a couple of added interests in Monday night's clash. One was the appearance of Charlie Goode of the Cape Breton hockey circuit, who handled the whistle as chief referee with Jackie Kane. From the press box, Goode's handling of the game was a big improvement over what has been seen here of late. He knows how to call them and doesn't waste any time in doing it. When he awarded a penalty to a player, everybody in the rink knew what it was for before it was announced over the public address system. Goode knows his game too, which was emphasized by the fact that there was very little unnecessary whistle blowing that not only speeded up the game but made it much more interesting to watch from the spectator's point of view.

Like all referees, Goode of course took a certain amount of ribbing from the crowd, that seems to be just part of the game as far as the fans are concerned but for those who know their hockey rules, it was not hard to see that the Cape Breton official knows his job and was calling his decisions right all the way through. When he handed out a penalty, there was no bickering with players over the decision, because as soon as it was awarded, he didn't hang around to invite such action. Which is as it should be. He insists on mingling with players and hanging around "sin bin" after handing out a penalty, he's just asking for an argument. He doesn't look like a guy to argue with anyway—when he waves a man off he means it, and the players weren't long realizing it either.

Two new players appearing with Hawks for the first time over local ice was the other added attraction. The two boys were Lorne Smith back on the Moncton defence, and Marcel Bessette who centered between Moushey Dowling and Lou Milani. Both boys came up with good performances and are no doubt proving to be added strength to Doggie Khun's roster.

Smith is a big husky boy that can not only block and check, but is a good puck carrier too, and should be a big asset to the Moncton blue-line corps for the balance of the season. Bessette, although of only medium build as far as hockey players go, is both aggressive and shifty. He skates fast and well and knows how and what to do with a puck when he gets it. He is not easy to hit and is dangerous in around net, and unless mistaken, should be one of the top pivot men of the Moncton team before the season is much older.

R. C. A. F. Meteors Win From S'ide Crystals 5-3

The R. C. A. F. Meteors won their first league game of the young hockey season last night at the Crystal Rink when they shaded the Crystals of Summerside by the score of 5 to 3. In the first period the ice was very fast and the boys, not used to this, made a lot of end to end flips. There was enough icing in that period to cover a lot of birthday cakes.

It took Summerside only 35 seconds to notch their first tally, Trainor or getting it on a pass from close in by Kelly.
